Peter Bishop: And anyway the people would say [speaking Cree and/or

French]. Yes, my father, you are right. That they were going to vote Liberal.

The reason for that was they didn't want to be excommunicated.

Ron Laliberte: Yeah.

Peter Bishop: They were afraid if they voted against the Liberal party they wouldn't be able to go to church, or receive Holy Communion, or get married

in church, or have a funeral in church, or buried in a cemetery by a priest.

Ron Laliberte: Right.

Peter Bishop: That's how it was.

Ron Laliberte: What the patronage was.
