# ELECTION RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. There will be polls in every registered local in the province. Polls will be open from 10:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M., August 1, 1980.
2. Each local will be required to send a voter's list to the Chief Returning Officer. This list will contain the names of every ELIGIBLE voter in the local.
3. An eligible voter is anyone described in By-law -1 Subsection (2) "Any Metis or Non-Status Indian who is a member in good standing of a duly registered AMNSIS local upon payment of the prescribed fee, can become a member of the Provincial Association provided that no member of AMNSIS shall have a right to vote with respect to the affairs of the Association until they are 16 years of age".
4. Any Metis or Non-Status person not on the voter's list may still cast their ballot by filling out a Registration For New Membership form at the polling station. This form must be filled out under the supervision of the Deputy Returning Officer. At the discretion of the Deputy Returning Officer a person wishing to fill out a Registration For New Membership may have to produce some proof of identification.
5. There will be 11 advanced polls in the Province to enable members to cast their ballots if they will be able to attend the polls on August 1, 1980. These advanced polls will be located at each Area Office or wherever designated by the Area Director. Advanced polls will be open during regular business hours from July 21 to July 31, 1980. The same procedures for eligibility will apply to the advanced polls as would apply at the regular polls on August 1, 1980. Members casting their ballots at the advanced polls will be required to fill out an "Advanced Poll Registration" form as provided by the Deputy Returning Officer.
6. Members who will be away from their home Local will be able to vote at any Local in the province upon filling out a "Registration for Absentee Members" form as supplied by the Deputy Returning Officer. Absentee and Advanced voters who wish to vote for the position of Area Director MUST cast their ballots at a Local in THEIR area. Voters casting their ballots outside their own area will only have the privilege of voting for the Provincial Executive positions. For example: A voter from the Southeast Area could not cast a ballot for their Area Director at a poll in the Extreme North Area.
7. This year the Chief Returning Officer will be supplying portable cubicles to ensure that all ballots are cast in secrecy. These portable cubicles will be distributed to each Area Director for distribution to the various locals.
8. Candidates in this election cannot enter the polling offices during voting hours for the purpose of campaigning.
9. Regarding rejected and spoiled ballots; a ballot will be considered rejected if the Deputy Returning Officer did not initial the back of the ballot or if there is anything on the ballot which puts in question the secrecy of the ballot (for example, any distinctive mark). A ballot will be considered spoiled if there is no mark on it indicating for whom the voter wishes to vote or the voter has voted for more than one candidate for the same position or there is anything other than the voter's X or check mark in the box indicating for whom the ballot is cast.

## METIS HERITAGE DAYS



Neither rain, nor sleet, nor hail could keep the approximately 9000 participants at this year's cultural celebrations from their fun.

The 1980 Metis Heritage Days we held again in Batoche, Sask. There were a few changes from the celebrations held in previous years. The Annual General Assembly of AMNSIS, generally held in conjunction with Batoche celebrations will be held this year on August 15 and 16, in Prince Albert, Sask. The celebrations this year were strictly of a cultural nature.

This seemed to meet with the approval of all concerned but a few other changes were not so well received. This year there were no rations or tents provided and there were a few grumbles heard because of this. In past years it has also been a general practice to hold nightly dances. This year, however, there were no dances and the participants were quite disappointed.

"With all these good entertainers and musicians around, you would think they could put on a real good dance," one participant was overheard to say. This seemed to be the general consensus of opinion.



The most likely reason for the lack of dances might probably have been an oversight on the part of the organizers or just a lack of communication. At any rate this is a problem that will have to be remedied in future years.

There were no rations provided this year because funds for rations were supplied in previous years for delegates to the Annual Assembly. Since the Annual Assembly was not held at this year's celebrations, no funds were allocated for rations. Participants were not pleased with this arrangement.

The AMNSIS Recreation Department will be circulating a questionnaire to all AMNSIS members in the near future regarding possible improvements to be made to the celebrations. Members who feel that rations should be provided to all participants might make mention of this when filling out the questionnaire. If there are enough people who feel that rations are necessary perhaps the funding agencies might take this into consideration in the coming years.



# MORE FUN AT BATOUCHE

Metis Heritage Days were celebrated at Batoche on June 28, 29 and 30. The three day event housed everything from Ball Tournaments to a Banrock baking contest. The grounds were filled with display booths, concession stands, T-shirt and jewelry stands and of course, the many tents, campers and vehicles of the celebrations.

On Saturday and Sunday Pow-wows were staged by the Gordon Reserve Dancers. Saturday they performed in the huge barn like complex, containing the indoor stage, while Saturday found them on the outdoor stage. The costuming and feathers were very colorful and eye catching as the rhythmic movements of the performers dictated the spirit of the dance. The highlight was the hoop dance performed by three young boys. They each proceeded to pick up twelve hoops, without missing a beat and placed them around their legs, arms, neck, waist, etc., somehow keeping them all together.

The Louis Riel Dancers from Edmonton, demonstrated their talents on the indoor stage. There were four couples providing over an hours worth of entertainment, much to the delight of the very large and very enthusiastic crowd. The costumes consisted of orange dresses with white trim for the women and brown pants and white shirts for the men. The dancers were accompanied by live guitar and fiddle music, as well as their own "caller" who also acted as spokesman for the group. The program wound up with a 94 year old member of the audience showing the audience his jiggling talents from days gone by. He was an immediate hit with all.

Entertainment for the children included a puppet show, held on the indoor stage. The story dealt with the Ile A La Crosse school closure and staff firing issue. Unfortunately, the show was stopped twice by the puppeteers as some children from the audience persisted in pulling the curtains and the puppets themselves.

After the show, the actors talked with the kids, told them how puppets were made and allowed those interested to try their hand at making a few.

The amateur talent show, held Sunday afternoon on the indoor stage, was an event that included all ages. There were fifteen scheduled entries, although four of the participants failed to show. The talent consisted of singing and guitar playing, one accompanying the other. The winner of the \$150 first prize was T.J. Roy of Regina. Second place of \$100 went to an Ontario man and third place of \$75 went to a middle aged woman from Lestock, Sask. Each of the winners were asked to perform an encore.

Saturday and Sunday evenings were alive and kicking as top native entertainers took over the outside stage. The crowd was really moving to a "good ole country beat" while applauding and cheering the impersonations of Ray St. Germaine. He captured the styles of Johnny Cash, Tiny Tim, Hank Snow, Will Carter and "the King" Elvis Presley.
