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
Kona liked to laugh out loud, but once she started she could not stop.

So Kona decided to ask the Gathering Spirit how to stop from feeling so happy.




The spirit said, "Kona, you have to think of something that is going to make you feel sad."



As Kona walked home she started to think of all the trees and how the leaves were beautiful colours of red, yellow and green. She knew that soon the trees would be bare.




Kona became sad and could not stop feeling this way so...

The spirit said, "Kona, you have to think of something that is going to make you feel angry!"


As Kona walked home she started to think about all the leaves on the ground and how the snow would soon cover the beautiful colours.








Kona became angry and could not stop feeling this way so...




She asked the Gathering Spirit how to stop feeling angry.



The spirit said, "Kona, you have to think of something that is going to make you feel surprised!"






As Kona walked home she started to think about the snow melting, and how everything on the earth begins to grow. She thought about the animals that come out to play, and she became surprised by this miracle.








Kona went one last time to the Gathering Spirit and asked, "Why did you want me to think of things that made me feel sad, angry and surprised?"






The Gathering Spirit said, "Kona, you have experienced feelings that have helped you see that our emotions change like the seasons. You have learned that one season cannot exist without the other."
