Métis Set to Participate in Aboriginal Education Summit

The Council of Ministers of Education, Canada (CMEC) will be hosting a Summit on Aboriginal Education on February 24 and 25, 2009 in Saskatoon. The Summit will be a high-level national political meeting of leaders in Aboriginal education policy and will include provincial Education Ministers, the federal Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern **Development/Federal** Interlocutor for Métis and Non-Status Indians, National Aboriginal Organizations (NAOs), and Regional Aboriginal Organizations (RAOs).

The overall goal of the CMEC Summit on Aboriginal Education is to establish a new relationship among leaders in Aboriginal education that respects jurisdiction and develops consensus on shared opportunities. Leaders will discuss strategies to move forward on eliminating the gap between the educational achievements of Canada's Métis, First Nations, and Inuit students and non-Aboriginal students.

Métis Nation— Saskatchewan (MN—S)

President Robert Doucette will represent the Métis National Council (MNC) at the CMEC Summit in Saskatoon. President Doucette will present a special report prepared by the Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) outlining the national Métis perspective on Métis education. The report was prepared in consultation with the MNC which, in turn, consulted with its governing members. The result is a comprehensive document outlining both the challenges in Métis education in Canada as well as the successes todate

The special report on Métis education, entitled Ka tipaymishoyak: Tapitow aen notay kishkaytamuk! (We are owners of our own destiny: We are always wanting to learn!), examines many of the challenges facing Métis education in Canada today. Challenges identified are: Jurisdiction and Control. Economic and Social Disparity. Access and Integration, and Sustainability and Capacity Building. These issues are examined in the context of lifelong

learning and education from early childhood through school age as well as the transitions to post-secondary education, the labour market, and ongoing skills development.

The report asserts that the unresolved issue of jurisdiction and control is at the heart of the breakdown in Métis education. The MNC recognizes that the jurisdictional issue has been the single greatest impediment to progress in developing a modern set of institutions, programs and services to meet the needs of the Métis. It has been and remains the longstanding position of the MNC that the federal government has jurisdiction and responsibility with respect to the Métis Nation by virtue of section 91(24) of the Constitution Act, 1867. However, years of jurisdictional wrangling has meant that Métis concerns have not been dealt with effectively by either level of government.

It is hoped that the Summit will provide a starting point to address some of these pressing issues in Métis education.

Included are updates regarding the website, intranet, anti-virus applications and some Windows shortcuts to possibly make your life easier.

Website Update

As discussed previously, GDI's website redevelopment continues at pace. We have revamped the news/events section to a latest news section, showing the latest four items, and a news archive is scheduled to be launched very soon with all other news items. This website will evolve into a more streamlined design that will be easier to use for returning and new visitors. The next changes coming will include: * A revised "About GDI" section to separate pages, including a Reporting section with Financial/Annual Reports: * A revised Employment Posting section will appear on both the intranet and the website, dependent upon internal or external advertising; and *A revised Program list, especially for the Dumont Technical Institute (DTI), will show current programs delivered and where they are delivered.

Intranet

Alongside website development, work continues on the intranet, which will be made available to all staff, and will include Policies and Procedures (once approved), internal job postings, Asset Disposal list, and some standard personnel forms available to download. Two sections of the Policies and Procedures are scheduled to be ready by the end of March and will be available on the intranet. Watch this space for further details

Anti-Virus

We have recently evaluated a new corporate anti-virus solution for the Institute. After shortlisting three products, we have decided upon Sophos Endpoint Security and Control. It will allow us to have a consistent program on every machine we use, and it will also go a long way towards blocking PUPS (Potentially Unwanted Programs and Software) and Spyware. There is a central control element as well that can alert IT of any virus attacks automatically. This program is used successfully by both the University of Regina and the University of Saskatchewan. The order has just been placed, and after a testing phase will be rolled out to all machines on our networks.

Hints and Tips

Have you ever wondered if there is an easier way to do things? Well there is. This section will be a regular column that will impart little tricks to help you in your everyday computing. This month: **The Windows Key.** See that little key in between alt and Ctrl on the keyboard with the Windows logo on it. This is called the Windows Key. There are a host of shortcuts assigned to this very key. Some of the popular ones are listed below:

- 1. Windows Key + E: Opens a new Explorer Window.
- 2. Windows Key: Displays the Start Menu.
- 3. Windows Key + D: Minimizes all windows and shows the **Desktop**.
- 4. Windows Key + F: Displays the **Find** all files dialog box.
- Windows Key + L: Lock your Windows XP computer.
- Windows Key + M: Minimizes all open windows.
- Windows Key + Shift + M: Restores all previously open windows
- 8. Windows Key + R: Displays the **Run** command.
- 9. Windows Key + F1: Displays the Windows Help menu.
- 10. Windows Key + Pause/Break: Displays the Systems Properties dialog box.
- 11. Windows Key + Tab: Cycle through the buttons on the Task Bar.
- 12. Alt + Tab: **Toggle** (switch) between open windows.

This year's Annual Report includes extended information on Board governance as well as a more detailed description of the Institute's structure.

For the 2007-2008 year, GDI marked a number of milestones. For employees who report via timesheets, the version attached to the December 22nd email is the one that needs to be filled out and submitted from January 1, 2009 onwards.


Original forms signed by both the employee and his or her direct supervisor must be submitted to Payroll.

"The last one didn't have a hole in (the tinfoil), and that's the one that popped the best," she said. "It was exciting to watch it."

Tinker's project was one of Institute's annual science fair,

the science fair gives students confidence and to learn about a particular idea in a hands-on way.

"They learn something they never thought they would even imagine," she said. "It does a world of wonders for them."

Majocha said that one of the keys to making the science fair, and the school, a success are the staff that she works

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Métis Literature and Culture Night a Success

On January 29 2009, GDI and McNally Robinson jointly hosted a Métis Literature and Culture Night at the Prairie Ink Restaurant in the McNally Robinson bookstore in Saskatoon. The evening featured readings, storytelling, and Métis entertainment. The evening's events were introduced and led by emcee Darren Préfontaine from GDI Publishing.

Rita Bouvier introduced and then read her latest book, *Better That Way*. *Better That Way* is a children's book that is beautifully illustrated by Sherry Farrell Racette. The book takes one of Rita's poems and tells it as a children's story. Rita credits Karon Shmon from GDI Publishing with the vision to transform the poem into a children's book.

Following Rita's reading, Darren introduced Stories of Our People/Lii zistwayr

di la naasyoon di Michif: A Métis Graphic Novel Anthology. Stories of Our People is a unique collection of Elder stories about the three Métis tricksters (Wiisakaychak, Nanabush, and Chi-Jean), werewolves (Roogaroos), cannibal spirits (Whiitigos), flying skeletons (Paakuks), and the Devil (li Jiyaab). The Elders' stories have been turned into full narratives by author Janice DePeel and then into graphic stories illustrated by Carrie Saganace. Contributing Elders and storytellers Norman Fleury and Jeanne Pelletier each told stories at the event. Other contributing storytellers for the collection are Gilbert Pelletier, Joe Welsh, and Norma Welsh.

Also part of the presentation of *Stories of Our People*, there was a reading of the amusing story about *Chi-Jean* and the red willows, read by David Morin from GDI Publishing. The collection has the distinction of being the first Métis-themed graphic novel produced in Saskatchewan by the Métis. It is part of the Institute's mandate to produce innovative and culturallyaffirming Métis resources.

Entertainment was also provided at the event, and between readings and storytelling, the audience was treated to the fiddle and guitar music of Dallas Fiddler-Boyer and Phil Boyer. At one point during the music, onlookers in the packed restaurant were fortunate enough to see Métis jigger Scott Duffee along with his son Noah, dance in front of the stage.

Following the readings and entertainment, the authors were available in the bookstore proper for signing. All-in-all, the evening represented a successful Métis literary event.

As details emerge about the April 2009 AGM, information will be made available through the GDI Communicator, internal email, etc.

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
