This style guide is intended to help you prepare the Works Cited list (MLA), Bibliography (Chicago) or Reference list (APA entries for resources housed on *The Virtual Museum of Métis History and Culture*. Finding Publication Information on The Virtual Museum

Each resource on The Virtual Museum has an information entry that looks like this:



This page is where you will find most of the publication information you require.

MLA STYLE

Generally, these are the data that must be included in a complete MLA citation and the order in which they must appear.

Name of Author or Creator

Title of Work

Original Publication information (if applicable, see below)

Title of Website

Publisher of website

Date of publication (Labelled as "date of copyright." If there is no date, use the n.d. notation)

Medium of Publication (Web)

Date of access

Print-based article (such as an essay):

If you are using the file directly from your computer screen:

Some essays that appear on *The Virtual Museum* are reproductions of materials produced by or owned by individuals or institutions from outside of Gabriel Dumont Institute. In the case of these resources, you should specify the original publication information. For example:

Barkwell, Lawrence J. Bottineau, Pierre and Jean Baptiste. Louis Riel Institute, n.d. The Virtual Museum of Métis History and Culture. Gabriel Dumont Institute, 28 May 2008. Web. 2 September 2009.

A Transcript of an Interview:

If you download the file to your computer to use it later, use this format:

Allery, Alex. Interview by Maria Campbell. The Virtual Museum of Métis History and Culture. Gabriel Dumont Institute, 28 February 2007. PDF file.

In these instances, I have included the name of the interviewer because her contribution may be deemed significant. The name of the interviewer and/or transcriber, however, can be left out if not important.

Photographs/Images:

NOTE: This style is applicable only to those images that appear on *The Virtual Museum* that are owned by the Gabriel Dumont Institute. Please see below for instructions for citing images owned by the Provincial Archives of Saskatchewan.

Include the following:

Photographer's or contributor's name
Title of the photograph
Date of the photograph (if no date is given, use the notation n.d.)
The name of the website
The publisher of the website
Date of copyright
Medium (Web)
Date of Access

An audio file:

Song Lyrics:

For an audio file or song lyrics that have originally appeared elsewhere, such as on a CD, include the original publication information. In the case of song lyrics, which appear on *The Virtual Museum* in transcribed form, specify that you are citing only the lyrics, and not the complete audio track.

A video file, including oral history resources:

Note that because the video clips are part of the Website, you specify the medium as "Web" rather than video.

Provincial Archives of Saskatchewan Images on The Virtual Museum

The Virtual Museum houses some Métis-specific images through a partnership with the Provincial Archives of Saskatchewan (PAS). Because the Institute owns neither these images nor the rights to them, you must specify in your citation that the images belong to the PAS. (Note: if you reproduce these images in any way, you must also obtain permission from the PAS. Follow the link at http://www.metismuseum.ca/browse/index.php/443 for more information).

A Works Cited entry for a PAS image on The Virtual Museum includes:

The name of the photographer (if known)

The name of the photograph, italicized

The date, if known (if undated, include the notation N.d.)

The original publication information (PAS, and the appropriate office, identified by the file number associated with the image)

The name of the website

The medium (Web)

The date of access

If required, include the URL, as shown below.

Note: for these specific resources, it may be useful to include the URL, which appears following the date of access and a period. Enclose the URL in pointy brackets.

You can also include reference to the original copyright owner as shown in the example below:

Chicago Manual of Style Guide for Resources on *The Virtual Museum of Métis History and Culture*

*The examples below are adapted from the note-bibliography style presented by CMS and favoured by the humanities, including history. Consult the *Chicago Manual of Style* for the more concise author-date format generally used in the natural sciences.

Generally, these are the data that must be included in a complete CMS citation and the order in which they must appear.

Author of the resource Title of the resource Title of the Website Publisher or Sponsor of the Website

File format of document (in the case of multimedia files)

URL (Note: Chicago style does not require the URL to be enclosed in pointy brackets)

CMS recommends that you include a date of access only if the material is time-sensitive.

Print-based article (such as an essay):

When a resource exists in one or more formats, or has been published by one or more institutions, CMS emphasizes citing the resource that you've actually consulted. However, you can indicate that the resource is available elsewhere, as shown in the example below. Please be aware, however, that if you reproduce the PAS images housed on *The Virtual Museum*, you must still contact the PAS for permission. CMS emphasizes referencing the source you've actually cited, and so it provides no guidelines for multiple publishers or copyright holders. Therefore, a basic entry for such resources looks like this:

A Transcript of an Interview:

Generally, the APA Publication Manual does not treat interviews as recoverable sources and so does not recommend a specific format for citing them. However, because the interviews on *The Virtual Museum* are stored in recoverable form as transcripts (or video or audio files; see below for citation format for these files), it is a good idea to include a reference following the format of a basic reference entry:

APA style does not provide guidelines for acknowledging previous copyright holders or multiple publishers; therefore a basic entry for such resources looks like this:
