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GDIT&E Receives AHRDA Extension

In early March 2010, GDI Training & Employment received written commitment from Service Canada that the current **Aboriginal Human** Resources Development Agreement (AHRDA) will be extended for up to six months. Client commitments were immediately renewed to ensure clients have funds in place for completion of the academic year. GDIT&E amended its commitments to clients up to June 30, 2010 with the expectation that a new agreement will be in place by July 1, 2010.

Furthermore, staff and lease agreement holders were informed of the extension and agreements are in the process of being extended.

During the six month extension period, a fiveyear business plan will be developed and submitted to Service Canada as a means of demonstrating the capacity of the Institute to transition from the AHRDA to the Aboriginals Skills and **Employment Training** Agreement (ASETA).

GDIT&E operates in a similar way to the three pillars of the new

Aboriginals Skills and **Employment Training** Strategy (ASETS) -**Demand Driven Skills** Development, Partnership Creation, and Accountability. As such, GDIT&E is well-positioned to make the transition from AHRDS to ASETS. GDIT&E strengthens Métis people's attachment to the labour market with meaningful, quality training and employment programs. The ASETA will enable GDI to design, manage, and deliver human resources development programs and services tailored to the needs and circumstances of Métis people and employers in Saskatchewan. GDIT&E will offer employment, placement, and training programs to Métis people throughout the Province of Saskatchewan, namely labour market development programs, including multi-barriered clients. GDI will work with employers to ensure ready workplaces conducive to diversity, specifically Métis people, and ensure programming meets the needs of the labour market.

Under the new ASETA, GDIT&E will retain the successful approaches, programs, and practices

established under the AHRDA. The Institute foresaw the ASETS direction and took a proactive approach in order to build in practices and structures that would support the demand driven skills development and partnership aspects of the ASETS. For instance, the Institute structured one of its Aboriginal Skills and **Training Strategic** Investment Fund (ASTSIF) projects to facilitate broad strategic partnership development with the employer community. Furthermore, the importance and necessity of participating in demand driven processes such as the ASEPs and the Aboriginal Service Delivery Partnership table cannot be understated. As such, GDI has been, and continues to be, highly involved in such processes.

GDIT&E is aiming to have the new ASETA agreement signed and in place for July 1, 2010.





Construction Program a Huge Success

On behalf of Jason (JJ) Johnson I was honoured to represent DTI at the Construction Readiness Program graduation ceremony in "Sakitawak" (Cree for Ile-a-la-Crosse) on Thursday Jan. 28th. This program was truly community-based: through consultation with local Métis leaders. DTI program coordinator Jason Johnson was able to designate the renovation of Sakitawak's Métis Local Building, the Jonas Favel Center, as the main hands-on class project. Renovations were literally conducted from the ground up, with

the students learning skills starting in the crawl space, through the floor joists, and continuing up to install 12-foot sections of drywall.

Instructor Victor Landry, also native to Ile-a-la-Crosse, informed me that throughout the program, one student in particular stood out. Edwin Corrigal consistently demonstrated determination and hard work. In fact, Edwin was so successful that he could not attend his own graduation ceremony due to already having gained employment with the Rabbit Lake Mine. Along with 300 other applicants,

he wrote the entrance test for Underground Mining Core Training, and later made a point of personally visiting his instructor Victor to inform him of the good news and express his gratitude. "Because of what I learned in this program, I passed the entrance test with flying colours!" Edwin said. Out of the 300 test-writers, Edwin was in the top 12 who went on to training and employment with the mine.

Congratulations, Edwin, you have contributed to a Métis legacy in your community truly earned vour bright future!

CMEC Releases Aboriginal Education Summit

The Council of Ministers of Education, Canada (CMEC) has released its Summary Report of the Summit on Aboriginal Education hosted last year (February 25, 2009) in Saskatchewan. The report, called Strengthening Aboriginal Success: Moving Toward 'Learn Canada 2020', summarizes the Summit's key findings and suggests possibilities for future collaboration and joint action. The report anticipates ways education systems might be strengthened to benefit Aboriginal learners. "The Summit on Aboriginal Education was a landmark event for CMEC. Of course, my colleagues and I remain committed to future collaboration and action," said Diane McGifford, CMEC Chair.

The Summit on Aboriginal Education was a high-level

national political meeting of leaders in Aboriginal education policy.

The overall goal of the CMEC Summit on Aboriginal Education was to establish a new relationship among leaders in Aboriginal education that respects jurisdiction and develops consensus on shared opportunities. Leaders discussed strategies to move forward on eliminating the gap between the educational achievements of Canada's Métis, First Nations, and Inuit students and non-Aboriginal students.


The CMEC report on the Summit identifies themes that present opportunities for collective action and for working together, including strengthening Aboriginal languages and culture, enhancing equity in funding, and increasing access, retention, and graduation

(postsecondary education and adult learning).

The Summit represents the first time leaders have come together in a national dialogue to discuss priorities for moving forward on eliminating the gaps between the educational achievements of Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal students in Canada.

As a historic gathering, the Summit achieved many of its objectives, including raising the public profile of Aboriginal education equity, the involvement and inclusion of National and regional Aboriginal organizations, and the identification of themes and priorities for moving forward. The Summit was only one step toward educational improvements. Ministers of education expressed their commitment to forging an ongoing relationship with National Aboriginal leaders and to strengthening their existing relationships with regional representatives. CMEC ministers affirmed that many of the themes and key priorities identified at the summit will continue to guide the priorities of CMEC.

DTI Receives New LMA Funding

In early March, 2010 DTI learned it would receive \$400,000 in Labour Market Agreement funding from the Ministry of Advanced Education, Employment and Labour. The funding is intended to support students through Job/Life Coaches and/or Program Coordinators. It is expected that these positions will primarily work with employers to

facilitate job placements and transitions, as well as arrange relevant programs in communities throughout the province. The intent of the funding is to assist students to address barriers they may be facing as well as to successfully attach to the workforce.

The funding is available for two years only through the federal stimulus

dollars provided to the Canada-Saskatchewan Labour Market Agreement. The \$400,000 funding is for the 2009-2010 fiscal year, which ends March 31, 2010. The funding is coming later than expected; however, DTI is prepared to utilize the funds as start up and salaries until the end of the school year, June 2010.



GDI Receives Saskatchewan Tourism Award

In March, 2010 GDI was honoured to receive a Saskatchewan Tourism Award of Excellence at the awards gala in Saskatoon. GDI Publishing received the award for Corporate Partner of the Year for their partnership with **Batoche National Historic** Site (BNHS). GDI Publishing has been involved in a four-year partnership whereby the staff have "made Métis history come alive by providing the expertise, knowledge, and activities to create exceptional visitor experiences" (Tourism Saskatchewan awards program).

The partnership between GDI and BNHS has meant that there has been programming and events at the park interpretive

centre that have focused on Métis storytelling, language, art, dance, and food. GDI has had an important role in bringing a true voice to the Métis cultural activities at Batoche, making the experience for visitors memorable and relevant. GDI has contributed to several on-going programs at BNHS, including the Caron Home Program Development. along with events such as the Métis Women's History of Resistance and Survival: Stories of Tourand's Coulee/Fish Creek and Batoche, and the Back to Batoche website.

Recipients were named in fourteen different categories. These categories recognize

excellence in both emerging and traditional areas of importance to the tourism industry. Finalists and winners were selected from nearly 90 nominations by a panel of industry representatives. The Corporate Partner of the Year award is given to a partner who is not traditionally recognized as part of the tourism industry but has shown exceptional support of tourism in Saskatchewan at any level. Various types of partnerships are considered, including financial, in-kind services or other initiatives.


According to traffic estimates provided by the


