GDI Surpasses \$1 M in Scholarship Awards

With the latest scholarship adjudication in May 2011. the Gabriel Dumont Scholarship Foundation (GDSF) is proud to announce that more than \$1 million in scholarships has been awarded to Métis students over the history of the fund. Since 1986, the GDSF has provided financial support to Métis students pursuing their academic goals. The GDSF operates with five Trustees who meet twice a year to make scholarship awards.

The main scholarship program administered under the Foundation is the Napoleon Lafontaine Scholarship, which awards funds to qualifying students for entrance, undergraduate, graduate, loan remission, and graduation

scholarships. The fund is named in honour of Nap Lafontaine, a Métis activist who devoted years of his life to the Métis and Non-Status people in Saskatchewan. He was an instrumental figure in the organization and establishment of the Association of Metis and Non-Status Indians of Saskatchewan (AMNSIS) in the mid 1970s. He also devoted his efforts to the development and recognition of social and educational policy for Aboriginal peoples.

The original \$600,000 endowment, which was made in 1985 by the federal Department of **Regional Industrial** Expansion under the Native Economic Development Program, has grown over the years - as has the scope of the overall program. Today the amount restricted for endowment purposes sits at \$2.34 million after the establishment of the \$1.3 million Gabriel Dumont Institute Training & **Employment Scholarship** and Bursary program in March 2008.

The success of the GDSF, and more recently the implementation of the GDIT&E Scholarship fund, have led to the establishment of scholarship agreements with key industry partners such as SaskEnergy, SaskTel, and Cameco. Contributions from these various partnership agreements, along with the interest earned on the endowment funds, are awarded to students in May and October of each calendar year.

Over the 25+ year history of the GDSF, approximately 1,800 scholarships have been awarded to the deserving students who meet the criterion of the various scholarship categories. More than 70% of these scholarships have been awarded to female Métis students, who also tend to make up a majority of students enrolled in GDI programs.



announce that new resources from their awardwinning Publishing Department are available this Spring and launching at the National Aboriginal Day celebration at Batoche National Historic Site. The first is a new children's story by Leah Marie Dorion called Relatives With Roots: A Story About Métis Women's Connection to the Land. This book is a heartfelt story about a Métis grandmother who takes her granddaughter out into the bush to teach her how to pick traditional medicines. As the granddaughter learns the traditional beliefs and stories about how the Métis people use the plants for food and medicine, she feels happy to be a Métis child with access to such wonderful cultural knowledge. This charming and vibrant book introduces

young readers to key concepts in the traditional Métis worldview while focusing on the special relationship between a young Métis girl and her grandmother. Relatives With Roots is the second in a series of children's books relating to traditional Métis values by Leah Marie Dorion. The first book, The Giving Tree: A Retelling of a Traditional Métis Story, was nominated in 2010 for a Willow Award in the Shining Willow category.

Gabriel Dumont: Li Chef Michif in Images and in Words is a compilation written by Darren R. Préfontaine, collecting all known images and newspaper accounts relating to Gabriel Dumont. Gabriel Dumont is an iconic figure in Métis and Canadian history. In the popular imagination, he is well known for leading the

Métis forces during the 1885 Resistance, and for being a renowned bison hunt leader, a Wild West show performer, and a husband to his beloved Madeleine. But outside of printed history and a fragmented oral history what do we really know about him? How has he been imagined over the past 125 years? This book answers these questions by focusing on visual and journalistic representations of Gabriel Dumont through time and space. Many of the book's images - some commissioned for this project and several newly found — have never before been published. Compiled together for the first time. these eclectic sources provide poignant vignettes of Gabriel Dumont's life, which will greatly enhance our knowledge about him, while further contributing to his leaend.



Collective Bargaining Update

As many of you are aware the Institute and its union have been busy negotiating a new collective agreement for the period of April 1, 2010 to March 31, 2013. Some of the more significant items that the negotiating committees have tentatively agreed to forward to their principals are as follows: -Deferred salary leave plan;

-Streamlined the language around article 11 – Probation;

-Enhanced article 20 surrounding dispute resolution; -Replacement of the current four increment dates per year to 12; and -Wage increases at 1.5%, 2%, and 2% over the three

years. In order for a final agreement to be reached,

both the Union membership

and the Gabriel Dumont Institute Board of Governors will need to approve the work of the respective negotiating committees. In anticipation of a successful resolution of the agreement the GDI Board of Governors had agreed to convene a conference call meeting prior to the summer break pending union approval of the proposal in order to make the agreement move forward.

In discussions with the Union bargaining Chair Russell Fayant we were hoping to have the membership exercise their vote on the package by the end of June. This would have meant that retroactive pay would have been processed for

the summer break. Unfortunately, Russell indicates that the tentative contract needs to also be approved by both the Union's Education Sector and the Administrative Committee of the Union's Provincial Council prior to being put forward for ratification by GDI's union members. Furthermore, Russell has indicated that the Administrative Committee will not be available to meet in June. nor for that matter, the rest of the summer. Pending notification from the union things have now been put on hold until fall. The union will be holding information sessions with its members during the month of June.

GDI To Announce Two New Projects

By James Oloo and Lisa Wilson On Wednesday June 29, 2011 GDI and its strategic partners will officially launch two new initiatives:

an Aboriginal Apprenticeship Initiative under the federal Strategic Partnership Fund and the signing of a GDI-Saskatoon Health Region Scholarship.

The Aboriginal Apprenticeship Initiative will empower Aboriginal people to enter apprenticeship programs and gain employment in the growing trades sector in Saskatchewan. Partnering with GDI in the initiative are, the Saskatchewan Apprenticeship and Trade Certification Commission, Saskatchewan Ministry of Highways and Infrastructure, and the Dumont Technical Institute. The project is funded under the Skills and Partnership Fund, a program of Human Resources and Skills Development Canada.

The second initiative to be highlighted at the event is a GDI-Saskatoon Health Region partnership to provide scholarships for Métis students to pursue postsecondary education in the health sector. The partnership agreement is a four-year pilot project cost-shared equally by GDI and the Saskatoon Health Region.

History Comes Alive in PA Classroom

The Level 3 students in Prince Albert have been busy recreating the past with the completion of their Métis trading post. The students recently hand-built their very own trading post, which includes a hand carved sign, made by one of the students. The instructor. Angela Letendre, explained that she developed the idea when the students were researching trading posts in Métis Studies and decided to put their own modern twist on the traditional idea.

Working with found and bought material, the students built their own shelving units, created their own curtains and signs, and even found traditional clothing to decorate the small trading post. "It's amazing when the student's find out they are very talented, when they have a creative atmosphere to apply themselves in," stated

Angela. "Many students start out the project with an attitude of 'I can't' and finish with an attitude of 'I can!' The transformation is thrilling for an instructor."

When asked about their projects, the students were enthusiastic about sharing their experience in building the trading post. "I really enjoyed the whole project. Being able to see it from start to finish was amazing. It showed me what it would have been like to have experienced it first hand, like the trappers did," stated Mike, a DTI student.

Another student, Ida, explained, "At first when I got the material to make the curtains, I didn't think it would look very authentic; but then when it was all put together I was really happy with how the room looked and felt. It was very cool to see what you have accomplished."

The students were asked to research how trading

posts were run, how currency was evaluated, and what relevance the trading post had to the Métis people. The students then applied these ideas to the trading post and their idea was created. The students have marked all of their donated goods for sale and the trading post will be open June 10th for the staff and students to enjoy.

Furthermore, last year the Prince Albert Level 3 students created a Métis cabin, complete with its own family, as well. Again the creative students re-created the traditional home of the Métis, which included building their own papiermâché family. The students were able to research what they needed and re-build the home with what they learned. It was put on display at the Prince Albert Exhibition last year to promote Metis culture in the community.
