Concession stands will also be provided by AMNSIS Locals.

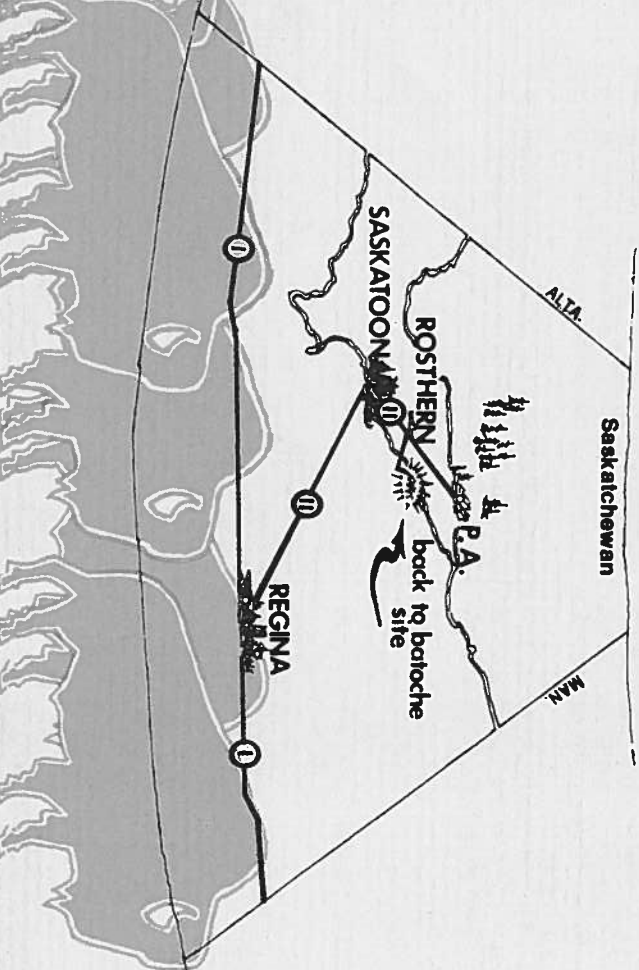
- * Tents and rations will not be provided.

BACK TO BATOUCHE 1885-1981

Ninety years ago our heroic ancestors fought to their deaths at Batoche. Buried here in Batoche cemetery which is now becoming a shrine to their heroism are Damase Carriere, Andre Letendre, Joseph Ouellette, Donald Ross, Calixte Tourand, Elzear Tourand, John Swain and Joseph Vandal.

It is also a shrine to the memory of Michael Trotter, Isidore Boyer and Ambrose Jobin who later died of wounds received at the Battle of Batoche.

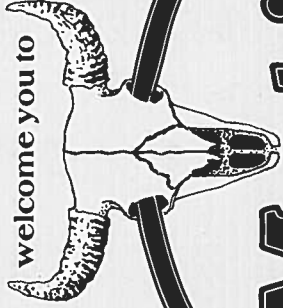
The site of Batoche is much more than a shrine to these heroes. It is also the symbol of all the Native people who fought to defend their homes, property and civil rights in Saskatchewan. It is a symbol of the struggle against injustice elsewhere in the world as well. Japa-Topa, Wa-pa-to-te-tye, Ah-si-we-in and Cha-pi-to-la-ta are Sioux warriors who came north from the United States to fight and die here at Batoche with their Metis brothers. The political and historical significance of Metis Heritage Days is one of great significance to the pride and dignity of the Native people.

For these few days at Batoche we will be once again living close to this piece of earth that has nourished us by reuniting us to our glorious history and culture.

The Metis of Batoche have a long history of being fun-loving, jovial people who can turn a simple event into a celebration including feasting, dancing, singing, and Red River jigging.

So the largest ever gathering of Native people is about to take place to celebrate once again with our brothers and sisters from all across Canada, to commemorate not only the heroism of our war dead, but also to relive the happy times of our fathers and mothers. This will include a cultural celebration of pow-wows, jigging, old and modern dancing, bingo, fiddling contests, amateur and professional entertainment and a variety of sports events for old and young alike.

This all adds up to making Metis Heritage Days the best tribute we can give to our heroes of the past, and it is the time and place to unite again to achieve our aspirations for the future.
