## **Frank Walters** (1898-1995)

Frank Walters was born in 1898, the son of Eugene Walters M.D. and Eva Needham. Eugene, an orphan in England, spent some time in the Baptist Home for orphaned boys. He subsequently moved to Jamaica as a Baptist missionary in 1887, and then moved to Canada.

Eugene (b. 1863) took his undergraduate training at Hulme Cliff College in Derbyshire education. He subsequently went to the University of Minnesota for his medical degree in 1891 and returned to England after graduation. He completed his theology training at Harley College in London and completed his medical studies by interning in a London hospital. In 1904 the family immigrated to Winnipeg in Canada. In 1907, he took one year of Medicine at the University of Manitoba to be accredited here. The family lived on Balmoral St. and had a summer home at Petersfield. Eugene served as minister at Gilolo just north of Selkirk. This church served the local settlers as well as Peguis reserve. He would commute from Winnipeg by train and horse drawn diplomat to do Sunday services. At the same time he practiced medicine in Winnipeg. He was a director of the North Winnipeg Hospital on Burrows Ave.<sup>2</sup>

Frank Walters married Minnie Foord (1911-1989) a Metis woman. They had three girls and two boys. Frank had started in Agriculture at the University of Manitoba but did not complete a degree. Frank and Minnie had land at Netley Creek<sup>3</sup> (Petersfield, formerly called St. Louis<sup>4</sup> after Gabriel St. Louis). Frank engaged in mixed farming and trapped muskrats. They lived out at Netley Creek until the 1970s.

In 1813 the HBC established a second post just north of the junction of Netley Creek and the Red River. Sixty horses were kept here to be used for transport of goods to Brandon House on the Assiniboine River. However, establishment of the Saulteaux farming settlement nearby, by Rev. William Cockran of the Anglican Church, and construction of Lower Fort Garry resulted in this post being closed.

St. Louis visualized the possibilities of the Petersfield area as a summer resort and townsite when the railway bridged Netley Creek, in the early nineteen hundreds. St. Louis encouraged businessmen from Winnipeg to invest in the project which included the north side of Section 27 15 4E and the south side of Section 22 15 4E. St. Louis dreamed of having small acreage sold to families who could have cows. He could establish a cheese factory, a lumberyard and implement dealership. When his dream was slow to

The Netley Marsh area as of 1805 was the most northerly limit of native horticulture. Historians believe that corn was raised by the Saulteaux. They kept gardens on levees within Netley Marsh. One was located approximately 1.5 miles (2 km) upstream from the Red River and Netley Creek Junction.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>4</sup> Petersfield was originally called St. Louis, for its founder, Romuaid Gadeau Xavier Saint Louis. Much is learned about the culture of the district from Frank Walter's book "Pieces of the Past". Mr. St. Louis discovered the area now known as Petersfleld when he came to explore the area with his friend Alexander Muckle, who had established a new life on Muckies Creek, almost three miles east of Clandeboye.

Frank Walters was a Metis historian and cultural preservationist with a particular interest in the Bungee (Bungi) language of his wife's family. This language was spoken by the so-called Orkney-Cree Half Breeds who lived in the parishes along the Red River north of the Forks and up to Lake Winnipeg. It was the language of his wife's grandparents and great grandparents. Franks best known article on the Bungi language is "Red River Dialects: Bungee as She is Spoke" which appears in his book *Pieces of the Past*, Winnipeg: Bindery Publishing House, 1993: 68-71. This book contains many anecdotes and historical vignettes from the St. Andrews parish of Manitoba. It is an update of:

Walters, Frank J., *Pieces of the Past : A Collection of Tales of Old Red River*. West Selkirk, Man: F.J. Walters, c1989.

At the time the book was written it was estimated that less than 200 people were able to understand, explain, or write Bungee. Previously, Frank had published his Bungee article in the journal of the Red River Historical Society. Frank spent his later years telling his stories to classes of children in the Lord Selkirk School Division.

Frank was a primary Bungee speaking informant for linguist Dr. Eleanor Blain. Eleanor's first major foray into linguistics was in her M.A. work at the University Manitoba with Dr. H.C. Wolfart. She wrote her M.A. thesis on Bungee – a mixed-language born out of Scots-Cree intermarriage. Her thesis is perhaps the main source of information about the language. It's of particular interest to people who are interested in studying modern varieties of Cree-English contact, such as so-called 'Indian English' or the kind of Cree that Métis people speak on settlements (some varieties of which show strong English contact).

While completing her thesis "The Bungee dialect of the Red River Settlement," Eleanor collected an oral history of the Red River Settlement and the Bungee dialect. She donated her transcribed tapes to the University of Manitoba Archives & Special Collections. She has placed this collection (1989) in the Eleanor Blain/Frank Walters Fonds at the University of Manitoba. Part of this collection contains the material collected by Frank Walters for his book *Pieces of the Past*. The fonds thus consists of two collections: the Walters Collection of Lower Red River Oral Histories (12 reels of tape recordings and 13 audio cassettes transcribed by Eleanor Blain; and the Blain Collection of Bungee Dialect Recordings (9 audio cassettes, as of now all these are off restriction).

On the Metis side of the family Frank's wife Minnie Foord (1911-1989), was the Metis daughter of Frederick John Foord (1879-1961) and his Metis wife, Margaret "Tina" Christine Kirkness (1886-1944). His Metis great grandparents were Joseph Kirkness
