Alfred "Rabaska" Schmidt. (1825-1901))

Alfred was born at Slave Lake, Athabasca country, thus his nickname "Rabasca." He was the son of George Peter Andress but raised by Edward Smith. He married Marguerite Lesperance, the daughter of voyageur Alexis Bonami Lesperance and Margeurite Grenon in 1847 at St. Boniface. Their son Louis acted as Louis Riel's secretary during the 1869-70 Resistance. Alfred then married Josephte Cree circa 1861 and Emelie Vivier c. 1867 at Fort Pitt. Emelie was a Treaty Indian of Seekaskootch's Band until she withdrew from treaty at Onion Lake in 1886. During the 1885 Metis Resistance they were held as prisoners at Fort Pitt by the Indians. For many years Alfred was a HBC freighter between York Factory and Fort Edmonton.
