Antoine Richard (b. 1851)

Antoine was born at St. Francois Xavier, the son of Antoine Richard Sr. and Josephte Lapointe. He married "Betsy" Elizabeth Fidler, the daughter of Augustin and Charlotte Lapointe. They had five children: "Willy" b. 1875; Ambroise b. 1877, Alexander b. 1880, Flora b. 1883 and Michel b. 1885.

In 1882, Antoine Richard came into the district of St. Louis in an ox-cart. It took a whole month to travel from Winnipeg to Fish Creek. On the way were seen, but very few Indian tents. The country was empty. They followed an old trail and ate buffalo meat or pemmican. After stopping at Saint Catherine, west of Prince Albert, they continued on to Saint Louis. They had brought along from Winnipeg, a bag of wheat for seeding.> In the archives in Saskatoon we read Antoine Richard lives on a homestead, with his wife and six children. Their house is sixteen by thirty-four feet and is worth \$100. The fence surrounding his property could be valued at sixty dollars.

In 1883 he broke nine acres of land, in 1884 and in 1886 two more acres. In 1887 he gathered his first crop from fifteen acres of cultivated land. It was Modeste Laviollette from St. Louis who countersigned as witness when Antoine patented his homestead.

On November 19, 1883, Antoine signed a petition protesting the 1883 Order-in-Council transferring the Metis lands at St. Louis Saskatchewan to the Prince Albert Colonization company. Later, in 1885, he participated in the Metis Resistance and is listed on Philippe Garnot's list of Resistance participant's.

After Betsy died in 1901 Antoine subsequently married Therese Elizabeth Swain born at Pembina, in 1902 at St. Louis. Therese was the daughter of Jacques Swain (b. 1814) and Marie Allary (b. 1820).
