Canadian Metis Council

On October 27, 1998 The Canadian Metis Council received its charter and mandate which were basically just a change of name and territory from the previous Southwestern Metis Council formed December 3, 1995 and incorporated February 7, 1997. Dr. John A. Roberts guided the forming of the Council to promote the well being of Metis People in all of North America by:

- providing educational and training programs for members,
- organizing and supporting provincial and local Metis Councils,
- researching, recording, reporting, and practicing the culture of the Metis People, and
- promoting healthy living patterns among Metis People.

Governed by an executive and advisory council the CMC has grown to over 10,000 members with 50 Community Councils. (Contributed by Martin Carrière.)
