The Avenger: Metis pioneer of West coast

In 1808 the Scottish explorer Simon Fraser opened up the Canadian far west in what historians call "the most terrible and wonderful inland voyage in the history of North America.

At his side in the churning rivers was Jean-Baptiste Boucher, voyageur extraordinaire an adventurer who stayed to pioneer the wild new land of British Columbia.

Born around 1785, Boucher was probably a descendant of the French soldier-diplomat Pierre Boucher, who had been governor of Boucherville, Que., more than a century earlier. But young Jean-Baptiste had the disadvantage of being a Metis, son of a Cree mother and a French father.

In the rigid social class system of early Canada, the label of "half-breed" would end any man's ambitions. But Boucher rejected limitations in every area of life.

Denied the title of Chief Factor in the Hudson's Bay Company, he did a factor's job, was given a house of his own, and became the first Canadian to strike for higher pay. The Indians nicknamed him Waccan — The Avenger - for his relentless pursuit of violent criminals in the lawless west. His marriage to the young Nancy Douglas, a Scottish trader's daughter, was a lifelong love match that surprised the raw colony. His descendants built the rugged northern interior of B.C.

A month later, Waccan married the Carrier woman in a brief ceremo-

But she hadn't. A week after the marriage she stole Waccan's money pouch. And one morning, when the first spring rains had melted the snow, he awoke to find her dressed for travelling, and with gun in her hand.

He didn't try. At 25, he had no interest in a lifetime of strife. Gratefully, he rejoined the ranks of the bachelors.

* * * * In the spring of 1811, Waccan's life was sharply disrupted by two events:

His half-brother, Duncan Liv-ingstone, was murdered by the Babine Indians in eastern New Caledonia.

And he made friends with Scottish company official James McDougall - who had come to the fort with his 18-year-old daughter, Nancy.

laughed, "we've left a trail of blood." From the front of the ragged line Simon Fraser Scalled, "Boucher! You, Waccan. Can you pilot? Only a madman can get us through here.

The tall young man put down his pack, scarcely noticing the loss of 80 pounds. As a teen-ager he had carried 150 on his back without flinching, and at 20 he was a fullfledged Nor'Wester, a company man who had navigated Canada from the east to the farthest west a man had ventured.

"I'm ready," he shouted back.

the many clerks and factors appointed by the fur companies. And after 1822, when the North West Company and the Hudson's Bay Company amalgamated, he was the senior employee of the northwest.

For Waccan, there were few peaceful moments. Returning to Ft. St. James from a scouting mission. he was sent to the Babine country to investigate the death of postmaster William Morwick, a Shetland Islander who had served the Hudson's Bay Company for many years.

This time the murderer was taking extraordinary precautions against revenge, and he had barricaded his house like a small fortress. With seemingly unlimited . ammunition he fired on Waccan and his handful of men.

"We must get him out of there quickly," said Kwes, their Indian guide. "If he gets the upper hand the tribe will turn on us."

"Maybe we can take him prisoner," said Waccan. He shouted at the fortified door, "Come out with the gun you used to kill Morwick. That's all we want. Bring it to the chief's house and the blood debt will . be wiped out.'

No answer. More gunfire. Again, Waccan shouled the condition. Five minutes later, the murderer walked out, Morwick's rifle in his hand. He walked along the path to the chief's house, Waccan a few paces behind.

The man threw the rifle on the ground, and turned to Waccan. Two shots rang out. From a bastion above, Kwes had hit his target.

"You disobeyed orders," shouted Waccan. "We were taking him back. That was murder!"

"No," said Kwes. "Justice. Here they don't draw any lines."

Silently they mounted their horses. The murderer's body lay face-down a pool of blood seeping slowly into the earth.

Weeks went by, and word reached the surrounding Indians. If Waccan had quit who was going to keep law and order? Minor fights broke out with trappers, but no company man rode down to reprimand them.

'Jean-Baptiste, a letter for you," cried Nancy as she ran back from the post office one morning, in her hand was a heavy vellum envelope with the seal of Hudson's Bay Company.

Waccan tore it open and they scanned it quickly ". . . so it pleases us to increase the salary of our faithful employee, Jean-Baptiste Boucher, dit Waccan, by 24 pounds a year.

"Simpson!" cried Nancy. "The governor himself."

He hugged her tightly. He had stood up to criminals, madmen, and the suicidal rapids of the Fraser. But no man had stood up to the company and won.

"Put the flag up, Billy," he called to his youngest son. "I'm going back to work."

* * * Waccan's career was never interrupted again. For the next 20 years he acted as interpreter, guide, hunter and virtual superintendent of Ft. St. James.

In the winter of 1849 Donald Manson, the chief trader of the fort, sent him down the river to Alexandria, a trading post where an unpopular official had been shot.

"My principal reason for sending the old man," Manson wrote in his journal, "is that he is known and respected by all the natives of the district . . . and his appearance there will be a very good effect.



But an epidemic of measles was raging in Alexandria. By the time Waccan had calmed down the local people and returned to Ft. St. James, he was stricken with it. Shortly after New Year he died.

For the Boucher family, the pioneering saga continued. Twenty years later Waccan's youngest son - one of 17 children — led a pack horse expedition up the Fraser River grasslands to a small, clear lake near Ouesnel.

Known as "Billy Bouchie" to the settlers, he was an aide to Sir James Douglas, and a founding member.of the Quesnel colony. A plaque, worn away with age, marks the spot where he settled at what is now Bouchie Lake Copyright Toronto Star Syndicate

John IMHOFF, born in New Carlisle, Quebec, on December 6th 1835, son of John IMHOFF and Charlotte BAKER-BLONDIN, married on October 7th 1861 at Holy-Family, Bathurst, to Virginia PITRE, born around 1839, daughter of Edward PITRE and Margaret HACHEY. They settled at South-Tetagouche.

Isaie or Isaac LEGACY, born around 1840, son of Francis LEGACY and Mathilda BOUDREAU, married first on August 7^{th} 1860, to Tarsille DAIGLE, and second on November 8^{th} 1864, to Mary YOUNG and for the third time, on May 31^{st} 1871, to Honora DALEY, born around 1845, daughter of John DALEY.

*** FIFTH GENERATION ***

Firmin BOUCHER, born October 4th 1809, son of Michel BOUCHER and Judith VIENNEAU, married on November 24th 1829, to Celeste LAVIGNE, born January 29th 1811, daughter of John LAVIGNE and Modeste HACHEY.

Athanase YOUNG, son of Etienne YOUNG, Micmac Indian, and Mary LAVIGNE, married on February 27th 1827, to Mary CHAMBERLAIN, born October 31st 1803, daughter of Jean-Baptiste CHAMBERLAIN and Mary PITRE.

Abraham CHAMBERLAIN, born around 1797, son of Jean-Baptiste CHAMBERLAIN and Mary PITRE, married on August 31st 1818, to Mary LAVIGNE, born December 9th 1800, daughter of John LAVIGNE and Modeste HACHEY.

David VIENNEAU, born February 24th 1800, son of Jean-Baptiste VIENNEAU and Madeleine LEJEUNE, married on July 30th 1824, to Madeleine LAVIGNE, born October 7th 1804, daughter of John LAVIGNE and Modeste HACHEY.

John IMHOFF came from Holland to the Gaspé Coast, where he married around 1817 Charlotte BAKER-BLONDIN, living in Perce, Quebec, but of German descent. They apparently settled first in Port-Daniel, Quebec, where five of their children were baptized. Two more of their children were baptized in New-Carlisle, Quebec. In the 1870's, John IMHOFF moved to South Tetagouche, N.B., to live with their daughter who was married to Oliver HENRY, the ancestor of the HENRYs of the region. John IMHOFF became a Catholic and was baptized in the Holy-Family church, Bathurst, on April 5th 1873, at the age of 85 years. Charlotte BAKER, John IMHOFF's wife, died at South-Tetagouche on June 18th 1893, at the age of 91 years.

Edward PITRE, born December 20th 1810, son of Charles-Olivier PITRE and Marie-Celeste COMEAU, married on September 14th 1831, to Margaret HACHEY, born January 1811, daughter of Joseph HACHEY and Helen LANDRY. **Francis LEGACY,** born in the province of Quebec around 1808, son of Louis LEGACY and Madeleine LEEVESQUE, married at Holy-Family, Bathurst, on June 30th 1830, to Mathilda BOUDREAU, born March 12th 1812, daughter of Joseph BOUDREAU and Rosalie HACHEY of Petit Rocher. They settled in South-Tetagouche.

John DALEY, born around 1804, probably in Ireland. His first wife is not known. She was the mother of Honora, Isaac LEGACY's third wife. John DALEY remarried on February 23rd 1854 at Holy- Family church, to Mary Martin.

*** SIXTH GENERATION ***

Michel BOUCHER, son of Joseph-BOUCHER and Elizabeth MARTIN, married at Holy-Family, Bathurst, on January 19th 1808, to Judith VIENNEAU, born in July 1785, daughter of Jean-Baptiste VIENNEAU and Madeleine LEJEUNE. Michel is the ancestor of the BOUCHERs around Bathurst.

John LAVIGNE, born August 28th 1777, son of John LAVIGNE and Elizabeth BEAUDRY, married on July 22nd 1798, to Modeste HACHEY, born at Miscou on March 19th 1780, daughter of Joseph HACHEY-GALLANT and Madeleine DOUCET.

Etienne YOUNG, Micmac Indian, son of John YOUNG, Micmac, and Madeleine DEDAM, Micmac, married on October 13th 1812, to Mary LAVIGNE, daughter of John LAVIGNE and Elizabeth BEAUDRY. Etienne is the ancestor of most of the YOUNGs of Bathurst.

Jean-Baptiste CHAMBERLAIN, born at Cap St-Ignace, Quebec, on November 11th 1753, oldest son of Jean-Baptiste CHAMBERLAIN and Louise-Ursule LEMIEUX, married first on the Gaspé Coast to Thérèse LEPEAU called "La Vieille", daughter of Julien LEPEAU and Marie BERTON, and second to Mary PITRE in Bathurst, born in 1762, daughter of Michel PITRE and Mary-Josephe ORILLON-CHAMPAGNE. Jean-Baptiste died in September 1814. He is the ancestor of all the CHAMBERLAINS around Bathurst. Mary PITRE died in November 1824, at age 66.

Jean-Baptiste VIENNEAU, born in 1754, son of Michel VIENNEAU and Thérèse BAUDE, married to Madeleine LEJEUNE, born in 1760, daughter of Eustache LEJEUNE and Mary-Ann BARRIAULT. It must have been his second marriage, because it is recorded in Caraquet church records when he died on August 9th 1808 at age 60, that he was a widower of his second marriage to Madeleine LEJEUNE, although there is no record of his first marriage. He is the ancestor of most VIENNEAUS around Bathurst.

Charles-Oliver PITRE, born in 1772, son of Michel PITRE and Mary-Josephe ORILLON-CHAMPAGNE, married in Caraquet on April 4th 1796, to Mary-Celeste COMEAU, born at Carleton, Quebec, on July 25th 1779, daughter of Francis COMEAU and Mary BEAUDRY.

Joseph HACHEY, born in 1780, son of Joseph HACHEY-GALLANT and Madeleine DOUCET, married around 1802 to Helen LANDRY, born at Caraguet on September 21st 1782, daughter of Anselme LANDRY and Mary BRIDEAU.

Louis LEGACY, baptized at Rivière-Ouelle, Quebec, on January 21st 1783, son of Basile MIGNIER-LEGACY and Catherine DUBE, married at Rivière-Ouelle on July 29th 1805, to Madeleine LEVESQUE, daughter of Joseph LEVESQUE and Thècle BARD.- Louis LEGACY came to N.B. around 1820 and settled at Green Point. He is the ancestor of all the LEGACY's of the region.

Joseph BOUDREAU, born around 1770, son of Joseph BOUDREAU and Jeanne-Marie HACHEY-GALLANT, married on October 30^{th} 1792, to Rosalie HACHEY, born in 1774, daughter of Joseph HACHEY-GALLANT and Madeleine DOUCET.

*** SEVENTH GENERATION ***

Joseph BOUCHER, baptized in 1736, son of Pierre BOUCHER and Mary-Catherine LIZOT, possibly the same Joseph BOUCHER who is the ancestor of the BOUCHERs of New Brunswick, married at Ste-Anne-de-la-Pacatière, Quebec, on November 16th 1761, to Mary-Rosalie MARTIN, baptized in 1741, possibly the same one called Elizabeth, daughter of Joseph Martin and Mary-Rosalie PELLETIER. Joseph BOUCHER came to the Maritimes around 1769 in the St-John River Valley. With the arrival of the loyalists in 1783-1784, he had to move and settled in Bouctouche. Two of his sons: Firmin and Joseph; married and settled in Caraquet. His son, Michel married and settled in Bathurst. Joseph BOUCHER died in Bouctouche on September 19th 1799. His wife died before 1795. They are the ancestors of all the BOUCHERs in N.B.

John LAVIGNE, born in Acadia around 1725, son of Nicholas LAVIGNE and Madeleine DOUCET, married around 1775 to Elizabeth BEAUDRY, daughter of Francis BEAUDRY and Madeleine BOISSEL. He died at Nipisiguit (Bathurst) on August 20th 1822, said to be around 100 years old. He was the ancestor of all the LAVIGNEs in the Martimes.

JOSEPH HACHEY-GALLANT, born in 1744, son of Charles HACHEY-GALLANT and Geneviève LAVERGNE, married at St-John Island (now P.E.I.) around 1765 in front of witnesses, which marriage was rehabilitated and blessed by the missionary at Nipisiguit (Bathurst) on June 22Nd 1772, to Mary-Madeleine DOUCET, born in 1748, daughter of Charles DOUCET and Ann ARSENAULT. Joseph died at Nipisiguit (Bathurst) in November 1822, said to be 76 years old. His wife, Madeleine DOUCET, died there on January 29th 1816, said to be 63 years old.

Jean-Baptiste CHAMBERLAIN, born March 30th 1724, died in 1764, son of Jean-Baptiste CHAMBERLAIN and Mary-Margaret LUMINA, married on January 11th 1753, to Louise-Ursule LEMIEUX, daughter of Charles-François LEMIEUX and Angelique GOULET. They were living in Cape St-Ignace, Quebec.

Michel PITRE, born at Grand Pré Acadia, in 1735, son of Jean-Baptiste PITRE and Cécile BOUDREAU, married at Quebec City, on May 11th 1759, to Mary-Josephe ORILLON-CHAMPAGNE, born in 1736, daughter of Charles ORILLON-CHAMPAGNE and Anne RICHARD. Michel PITRE is the ancestor of all the PITREs around Bathurst. He died before 1790. His wife died at Nipisiguit (Bathurst), on November 24th 1808, said to be 75 years old. **Michel VIENNEAU**, born in France around 1706, originated from St-Martin-de-Bollène, diocese of St-Paul-Trois-Châteaux, France, married in France around 1730 to Thérèse BAUDE. They were at St-Charles-de-Bellechasse, Quebec in 1758. They settle at St-John River Valley, Acadia, around 1769, but had to move away with the arrival of the loyalists in 1783-84. Michel VIENNEAU died at Memramcook at the age of 100 years 3 months. He is the ancestor of all the VIENNEAUs.

Eustache LEJEUNE called Briard, born in Pisiguit, Acadia, in 1714, son of Martin LEJEUNE and Marie GAUDET of Port Royal, Acadia, married around 1747 to Mary-Ann BARRIAULT, daughter of Jacques BARRIAULT and Mary-Ann TURPIN.

Francis COMEAU called "Junior" because he had an older brother also named Francis, born at Chipoudy, Acadia, in 1756, son of Ambroise COMEAU and Marguerite CORMIER married at Carleton, Quebec on July 1st 1778, to Mary BEAUDRY, daughter of Francis BEAUDRY and Madeleine BOISSEL, and married a second time around 1795, at Nipisiguit (Bathurst), to Isabelle BOUDREAU, widow of Michel FRENETTE, and daughter of Athanase BOUDREAU, and Félicity ORILLON-CHAMPAGNE. By so doing, he became the stepfatherof the first FRENETTEs in N.B., and is also the ancestor of most of the COMEAUs in the region. Francis COMEAU settled at Beresford.

Anselme LANDRY, fisherman, born at Beaubassin, Acadia, on March 11th 1746, son of Alexis LANDRY and Marie THERIAULT, married around 1775 to Mary BRIDEAU, born at Quebec in 1761, daughter of Louis BRIDEAU and Mary-Thérèse THOMAS. In 1771, he was the captain of the boat called "Marie", with a 3 men crew. Three of his sons drowned together at "Cap-au-Meules", on June 22nd 1814. Anselme LANDRY was one of the founders of Grand Anse, where he settled. He died on December 16th 1806. His wife died at Grand Anse in 1848.

Basile MIGNIER called "Legacy", baptized at Ste-Annede-la-Pocatière, Quebec, on January 27th 1747, son of Michel MIGNIER-LEGACY Marguerite PELLETIER married at La Pocatière and on January 14th 1772, to Madeleine LECLERC, daughter of Joachim LECLERC and Catherine SOUCY. He married a second time, at Rivière-Ouelle, Quebec, on October 11th 1779, to Catherine DUBE, daughter of Jean-François DUBE and Marie COTE. Louis LEGACY, the ancestor of the LEGACYs of the region, was born out of the second marriage. Joseph-Marie LEVESQUE, baptized at Rivière-Ouelle, Quebec on October 28th 1752, son of Dominic LEVESQUE and Mary-Dorothy BERUBE, married at Rivière-Ouelle on November 9th 1778, to Thècle BARD, daughter of Joseph-Maire BARD and Mary-Judith DUBE.

Joseph BOUDREAU, born at Beaubassin, Acadia, around 1738, son of Anselme BOUDREAU and Marguerite GAUDET, married at Restigouche, Quebec, on January 7th 1761, to Jeanne-Marie HACHEY-GALLANT, born in St-John Island (P.E.I.), in 1738, daughter of Jacques HACHEY-GALLANT and Mary-Josephte BOUDREAU. Joseph BOUDREAU died at Nipisiguit (Bathurst), on December 8th 1797. He was one of the ancestors of the BOUDREAUs around the region.

Pierre BOUCHER, baptized at Rivière-Ouelle, Quebec, on November 17th 1697, buried at Rivière-Ouelle on March 4th 1774, son of Pierre BOUCHER and Mary-Madeleine DANCOSSE, married at Ste-Anne-de-la-Pocatière, Quebec, on August 17th 1726, to Mary-Catherine LIZOTTE, baptized in 1705, buried at Rivière-Ouelle on April 16th 1779, daughter of Noël LIZOTTE and Catherine MENEUX.

Joseph MARTIN, baptized in 1713, son of François-Lucien MARTIN and Marie-Françoise AUTIN, married at St-Roch, Quebec, on November 21st 1740, to Marie-Rosalie PELLETIER, baptized in 1722, daughter of Charles PELLETIER and Barbe ST-PIERRE.

Nicholas LAVIGNE, born in France around 1692, son of Claude LAVIGNE and Françoise LEDOUR, of St-Denis, near Paris, France, married at Port-Royal, Acadia, on March 4th 1715, to Madeleine DOUCET, born in Acadia in 1694, daughter of Charles DOUCET and Huguette GUERIN. In a second marriage, Nicholas LAVIGNE married at Port-Toulouse, Cape Breton, Mary-Ann CLEMENCEAU, daughter of Jean CLEMENCEAU and Anne ROY.

Jean-François BEAUDRY, baptized at Quebec City on March 27th 1730, son of Jean BEAUDRY and Louise DOYON, married around 1757, to Mary-Madeleine BOISSEL, baptized at Quebec City on April 27th 1737, daughter of Antoine BOISSEL and Madeleine LAROCHE.

Charles HACHEY-GALLANT, born at Beaubassin, Acadia, in 1698, son of Michel HACHEY-GALLANT and Anne CORMIER, married at Beaubassin on February 24th 1727, to Geneviève LAVERGNE, born at Port-Royal, Acadia, in 1708, daughter of Pierre Lavergne and Ann BERNON. Most of the HACHEY-GALLANTS moved and settled at St-John Island (now P.E.I.) in 1721. They were caught in the Deportation of the Acadians from 1755 to 1763. Charles HACHEY-GALLANT and his wife, who are the ancestor of the HACHEYs around Bathurst, died at Nipisiguit (Bathurst). **Charles DOUCET**, born at Beaubassin, Acadia, in 1725, son of François DOUCET and Marie POIRIER, married at Beaubassin on January 10th 1746, to Ann ARSENAULT, born at Beaubassin around 1726, daughter of François ARSENAULT and Marguerite BERNARD. Charles DOUCET, sometimes called "Charlitte", escaped the Deportation by moving around and hiding here and there in the woods with his family. After the Deportation, he settled on Miscou Island for a while. He came to Nipisiguit (Bathurst) around 1782. It was on his land that the Holy-Family Church was built. He is the ancestor of all the DOUCETs in the region. He died at Nipisiguit on September 19th 1798.

Jean-Baptiste CHAMBELAIN, baptized at St-François, Ile D'Orleans, Quebec, on March 26th 1701, buried there on March 17th 1764, son of Gabirel CHAMBERLAIN and Catherine ALAIRE, married first at Holy-Family, Ile D'Orleans, on May 30th 1723, to Mary-Margaret LUMINA, baptized in 1697; buried at St-Anne-de-la-Pocatière, Quebec, on June 29th 1726, daughter of Jean LUMINA and Marie QUEVILLON, and widow of Joseph PELLETIER. Jean-Baptiste married a second time, at Cape St-Ignace, Quebec, on April 28th 1727, to Mary-Josephte GAUTHIER, daughter of Jacques GAUTHIER and Agathe FAYE.

Charles-François LEMIEUX, baptized in 1705, died at Cape St-Ignace, Quebec, on October 20^{th} 1763, son of François LEMIEUX and Mary-Ann PARADIS, married at St-Pierre, Ile D'Orleans, Quebec, on November 6^{th} 1727, to Angelique GOULET, born in 1706, and buried at St-Thomas, Quebec, on December 30^{th} 1760, daughter of Jean-Baptiste GOULET and Marguerite BLOUARD.

Jean-Baptiste PITRE, born at Port-Royal, Acadia, in 1711, son of François PITRE and Anne PRÉJEAN, married around 1733 to Cécile BOUDREAU, born in 1713, daughter of Michel BOUDREAU and Cécile LEBLANC. Jean-Baptiste was buried at Quebec City, on June 9th 1758.

Charles ORILLON called "Champagne", born at Port-Royal, Acadia, in 1713, buried at Nicolet, Quebec, on March 20th 1790, son of Charles ORILLON-CHAMPAGNE and Marie BASTARACHE, married at Port-Royal on September 22nd 1734, to Mary-Ann RICHARD, born at Port-Royal in 1718, daughter of François RICHARD and Anne COMEAU. Charles married a second time at Nicolet, Quebec, on June 27th 1763, to Mary DOUCET, widow of Jean-Baptiste GAUDET. Martin LEJEUNE called "Briard", born in 1661, married first at Port Royal, Acadia, around 1680, to Marie-Jeanne KAGIJONIAS, an Indian, and in a second marriage, around 1698, to Marie GAUDET, born in 1682, daughter of Jean GAUDET and Jeanne HENRY.

Jacques BARRIAULT, born at Pisiguit, Acadia, in 1705, son of Nicholas BARRIAULT and Martine HÉBERT, married at Grand Pré, Acadia, on July 22^{Nd} 1726 to Mary-Ann TURPIN, born at Cobequid, Acadia, in 1709, daughter of Jean TURPIN and Catherine BOURG.

Ambroise COMEAU, born at Port-Royal, Acadia, in 1704, son of Pierre COMEAU and Jeanne BOURG, married around 1730, to Marguerite CORMIER, born at Beaubassin, Acadia, in 1710, daughter of Germain CORMIER and Marie LEBLANC. Ambroise COMEAU settled at Carleton, Quebec, after the Deportation. He is the ancestor of the COMEAUs of the Gaspe Peninsula.

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Alexis LANDRY, born at Grand Pré, Acadia, in 1721, died at Caraquet on March 6th 1798, and buried at Ste-Anne-du-Bocage, son of Jean LANDRY and Claire LEBLANC, married at Beauséjour, Acadia, in 1745, to Marie THÉRIAULT, born in 1719, widow of Jean-Baptiste CORMIER, and daughter of Jean THÉRIAULT and Madeleine BOURG. Alexis LANDRY, managed to escape the Deportation by moving to the Miramichi, to Caraquet, to Bonaventure, Quebec, and back to Caraquet. He was one of the founders of Caraquet, and is the ancestor of the LANDRYs around Caraquet, and was the stepfather of the first CORMIERs around these parts. He was a trader and boat builder.

Louis BRIDEAU, son of Jean-Hilaire BRIDEAU and Marie-Josephte PAQUET, married at Charlesbourg, Quebec, on July 5th 1756, to Marie-Thérèse THOMAS called "Bigaouette", baptized at Charlesbourg on August 19th 1735, daughter of Jacques THOMAS and Thérèse PEPIN. Louis BRIDEAU was a carpenter and lived in Paspebiac, Quebec, before coming to Caraquet where he lived for 15 years. He finally settled at Tracadie, N.B., where he died on December 2nd 1801. He is the ancestor of all the BRIDEAUs in the Maritimes. His wife died at Tracadie on December 12th, 1801.

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Michel MIGNIER called "Legacy", baptized at Rivière-Ouelle, Quebec, on March 26th 1714, son of Michel MIGNIER-LEGACY and Angelique THIBAULT, married at St-Roch, Quebec, on January 9th 1736, to Marguerite PELLETIER, baptized at Ste-Anne-de-la-Pocatière, Quebec, on February 16th 1717, daughter of Jean-Baptiste PELLETIER and Angelique-Marguerite OUELLET.

Jean-François DUBE. son of Louis DUBE and Cecile EMOND, married at Rivière-Ouelle, Quebec, on November 5th 1748, to Marie-Angelique COTE, daughter of Jean-Baptiste COTE and Geneviève BERNIER.

Dominique LEVESQUE, baptized in 1721, son of François-Robert LEVESQUE and Marie-Charlotte AUBER, married first at Rivière-Ouelle, Quebec, on July 19th 1745, to Marie-Dorothy BERUBE, baptized in 1728, daughter of Pierre BERUBE and Geneviève DANCOSSE. Dorothy was buried on February 3rd 1755, and Dominic LEVESQUE remarried at Rivière-Ouelle, on February 14th 1757, to Mary-Ann DIONNE, baptized in 1735, daughter of Antoine DIONNE and Mary-Ann LISOTTE.

Joseph-Marie BARD called "Jambard", baptized in 1720, son of Jean BARDE and Marie-Josephte TALON, married at Cape St-Ignace, Quebec on September 18th 1752, to Mary-Judith DUBE, daughter of Joseph DUBE and Marguerite-Barbe CLOUTIER.

Anselme BOUDREAU, born at Beaubassin, Acadia, around 1706, son of Michel BOUDREAU and Madeleine CORMIER, married around 1725 to Marguerite GAUDET, born around 1706, daughter of Claude GAUDET, born around 1706, daughter of Claude GAUDET and Marguerite BELOU.

Jacques HACHEY-GALLANT, born at Beaubassin, Acadia, in 1712, son of Michel HACHEY-GALLANT and Anne CORMIER, married at Port-Lajoie, Ile-St-Jean (now P.E.I.), on June 20th 1735, to Marie-Josephte BOUDREAU, born at Port-Royal, Acadia, in 1717, daughter of François BOUDREAU and Jeanne LANDRY.

Pierre BOUCHER, baptized on May 10th 1673, at Holy-Family, Ile D'Orleans, Quebec son of Pierre BOUCHER and Marie ST-DENIS, married at Rivière-Ouelle, Quebec, on February 4th 1697, to Marie-Madeleine DANCOSSE, daughter of Pierre DANCOSSE and Marie-Madeleine BOUCHARD.

Noel LIZOT or LISOTTE, baptized at Quebec City, on October 29^{th} 1677, buried at Ste-Anne-de-la-Pocatière, Quebec, on February 12^{th} 1740, son of Guillaume LIZOT and Anne PELLETIER, married at Rivière-Ouelle, Quebec, on February 28^{th} 1702, to Catherine Meneux, baptized in 1682, buried at Rivière-Ouelle, on December 13^{th} 1751, daughter of Jacques MENEUX and Marguerite LE PREVRIER.

François-Lucien MARTIN, baptized at Quebec City on June 23rd 1683, son of Joachim MARTIN and Ann PETIT, married at Rivière-Ouelle, Quebec, on November 25th 1710, to Marie-Françoise AUTIN, baptized at Rivière-Ouelle on June 29th 1689, daughter of François AUTIN and Marie BOUCHER.

Charles PELLETIER, baptized at Quebec City on September 27th 1671, son of Jean PELLETIER and Ann LANGLOIS, married first at Rivière-Ouelle, Quebec, on January 7th 1697, to Marie-Thérèse OUELLET, baptized in 1679. daughter of René OUELLET and Thérèse MIGNOT. Thérèse OUELLET was buried at Rivière-Ouelle, on July 26th 1707, and Charles PELLETIER remarried at Rivière-Ouelle, on January 12th 1711, to Barbe ST-PIERRE, baptized at Montreal on January 17th 1685, daughter of Pierre ST-PIERRE and Marie GERBERT.

Charles DOUCET, born at Port-Royal, Acadia, in 1665, son of Germain DOUCET and Marie LANDRY, married at Port-Royal around 1685, to Huguette GUERIN, born at Port-Royal in 1666, daughter of François GUERIN and Ann BLANCHARD.

Jean BEAUDRY, baptized at Three-Rivers, Quebec, on July 3^{rd} 1684, son of Guillaume BEAUDRY and Marie-Jeanne SOULARD, married at Quebec City on October 8^{th} 1221, to Louise DOYON, baptized at Quebec City on June 3^{rd} 1703, daughter of Nicholas DOYON and Geneviève GYEYON. Louis DOYON was buried at Detroit on September 15th 1778. Antoine-Marie BOISSEL, navigator, born at Mont-Louis, Quebec on May 29th 1711, and baptized at Quebec City on August 28th 1712, son of Claude BOISSEL and Marguerite MORIN, married at Quebec City, on October 4th 1734, to Madeleine LAROCHE, born at Quebec City on April 2nd 1708, daughter of Michel LAROCHE called "Fontaine" and Marie-Anne BISSON.

Michel HACHEY-GALLANT, born in 1663, probably the son of Pierre LARCHÉ and Adrienne LANGLOIS, married at Beaubassin, Acadia, around 1690, to Ann CORMIER, born at Beaubassin in 1674, daughter of Thomas CORMIER and Madeleine GIROUARD. It is not known where exactly Michel HACHEY-GALLANT was born. When he became an orphan, when still a young boy, he was raised by Michel LeNEUF, Lord of LaVALLIERE, who later became Lord of Beaubassin, Acadia. Michel HACHEY-GALLANT gave his name as Michel LARCHÉ until around 1686. He moved to Ile-St-Jean (now known as Prince Edward Island) with his family in 1721. That is where the HACHEY-GALLANTs were during the Deportation of the Acadians. Michel HACHEY-GALLANT drowned on April 10th 1737 and was buried on July 17th 1737. He is the ancestor of all the HACHEYs and the GALLANTs in the Maritmes.

Pierre LAVERGNE, born around 1680, servant for the missionary, married around 1702 to Anne BERNON - No other information.

François DOUCET, born at Beaubassin, Acadia, in 1691, son of Toussaint DOUCET and Mary CAISSY, married at Beaubassin on November 20th 1715, to Mary POIRIER, born at Beaubassin in 1694, daughter of Michel POIRIER and Mary CHIASSON.

François ARSENAULT, born in 1694, son of Pierre ARSENAULT and Marie GUERIN, married at Beaubassin, Acadia, on January 10th 1719, to Marguerite BERNARD, born around 1701, daughter of René BERNARD and Madeleine DOUCET.

Gabriel CHAMBERLAIN, baptized at Holy-Family, Iled'Orleans, Quebec, on February 26^{tb} 1677, buried at Quebec City on August 24^{tb} 1758, son of Simon CHAMBERLAIN and Marie BOISLEAU, married at St-Francis, Ile d'Orleans, on November 3^{td} 1694, to Catherine ALAIRE, baptized at Quebec City in 1677, buried at Quebec City on November 20^{tb} 1753, daughter of Charles ALAIRE and Catherine FIEVRE. Jean LUMINA or LUMINEAU, son of Jean LUMINEAU and Michelle COILLER of Fontenay-le-Comte, diocese of Poitiers, France married at Montreal on May 16^{th} 1689, to Marie QUEVILLON, baptized at Montreal on August 28^{th} 1673, daughter of Adrien QUEVILLON and Jeanne HUNAULT.

François LEMIEUX, baptized at Quebec City, on November 12^{tb} , 1676, son of Guillaume LEMIEUX and Elizabeth LANGLOIS, married around 1698 to Marie PARADIS, baptized at St-Pierre, Ile d'Orleans, Quebec, on September 4^{th} 1681, buried at Cape St-Ignace, Quebec, on January 9^{th} 1738, daughter of Guillaume Paradis and Geneviève Milloueror MILLOY.

Jean-Baptiste GOULET, baptized in 1677, buried at St-Pierre, Ile d'Orleans, on April 10th 1744, son of Nicholas GOULET and Xainte CLOUTIER, married at St-Pierre, on November 9th 1700, to Marguerite BLOUARD, baptized at St-Pierre on December 6th 1679, buried at St-Pierre on September 15th 1754, daughter of Mathurin BLOUARD and Marie-Marguerite POLET.

François PITRE, born at Port-Royal, Acadia, in 1682, son of Jean PITRE and Marie PESSELET, married at Port-Royal on July 27th 1705, to Ann PREJEAN, born at Port-Royal in 1687, daughter of Jean PREJEAN and Andrée SAVOIE. François PITRE was buried at Port-Royal on December 6th 1725.

Michel BOUDREAU, born at Grand Pré, Acadia, in 1687, son of Claude BOUDREAU and Anne-Marie THIBODEAU, married first around 1708, to Marie-Cécile LEBLANC, born at Grand Pré in 1686, daughter of Jacques LEBLANC and Catherine HÉBERT. In a second marriage, Michel BOUDREAU married at Port-Royal, on April 16th 1732, to Anne PREJEAN, widow of François PITRE.

Charles ORILLON called "Champagne", born in France in 1653, son of Julien ORILLON and Anne ROGER, from the town to Laflèche, diocese of Angers, France, arrived in Acadia around 1703, married at Port-Royal on January 8^{th} 1704, to Marie BASTARACHE, born at Port-Royal in 1684, daughter of Jean BASTARACHE and Huguette VINCENT. François RICHARD, born in France around 1686, son of Jean RICHARD, wine merchant, and Anne CRISTIN, of the town of Auray, Bretagne, France, married first at Port-Royal Acadia, on October 29th 1710, to Anne COMEAU, born at Port-Royal in 1685, daughter of Jean COMEAU and Françoise HEBERT, and widow of Claude-Louis D'AMOUR. François RICHARD married a second time at Port-Royal on October 26th 1722, to Mary MARTIN, born at Port-Royal, in 1700, daughter of René MARTIN called "Barnabé" and Marie MEUNIER.

Jean GAUDET, born at Port-Royal, Acadia, in 1643, son of Jean GAUDET and Nicole COLESON, married first around 1671, to Marie Comeau, daughter of Pierre COMEAU and Rose BAYOL, and secondly, around 1681, married Jeanne-HENRY.

Nicholas BARRIAULT, born in France in 1646, arrived in Acadia around 1671, married around 1682 to Martine HEBERT, born at Port-Royal, Acadia, in 1665, daughter of Etienne HEBERT and Marie GAUDET.

Jean HERPIN or TURPIN, born in France around 1684, army sergeant, son of Claude TURPIN and Anne PRISSEAU of Sancerre, Berry, France, married at Port-Royal, Acadia, on January 16th 1708, to Catherine BOURG, born in 1680, daughter of Jean BOURG and Marguerite MARTIN.

Pierre COMEAU, born at Port-Royal in 1653, son of Pierre COMEAU and Rose BAYOL, married around 1677 to Jeanne BOURG, born at Port-Royal in 1659, daughter of Antoine BOURG and Antoinette LANDRY.

Germain CORMIER, born at Beaubassin, Acadia, in 1676, son of Thomas CORMIER and Madeleine GIROUARD, married around 1704 to Marie LEBLANC, born at Grand Pré, Acadia, in 1687, daughter of André LEBLANC and Marie DUGAS.

Jean LANDRY, born at Grand Pré, Acadia, in 1693, son of René LANDRY and Ann THÉRIAULT, married at Grand Pré, in 1717, to Cláiré LEBLANC, born at Grand Pré in 1696, daughter of René LEBLANC and Ann BOURGEOIS. Jean LANDRY probably married a second time to Blanche LEBLANC. He escaped the Deportation at Grand Pré by moving to Ile St-Jean (now P.E.I.), but was deported from there to France in 1758.

Jean THERIAULT, born at Grand Pré, Acadia, in 1690, son of Germain THERIAULT and Ann RICHARD, married at Beaubassin, Acadia, on October 3rd 1712, to Madeleine BOURG, born at Port-Royal, Acadia, in 1696, daughter of Michel BOURG and Elizabeth MELANSON. Jean-Hilaire BRIDEAU, baptized at Quebec City on August 28th 1692, buried at Cape St-Ignace, Quebec, on May 7th 1757, son of Jean BRIDEAU and Marie CRETE, married first at Quebec City on September 3rd 1716, to Marie-Josephte PAQUET, baptized at Quebec City on March 24th 1743, daughter of Pierre PAQUET and Marie CHARLAND. In a second marriage, Jean-Hilaire married at Cape St-Ignace, on June 17th 1754, to Marie-Marthe GAMACHE, baptized on July 10th 1710, daughter of Louis GAMACHE and Angélique MIVILLE.

Jacques THOMAS, baptized at Charlesbourg, Quebec, on February 17th 1713, buried at Charlesbourg on December 16th 1743, son of Claude THOMAS and Marie-Anne VILLENEUVE, married at Charlesbourg on February 4th 1734, to Thérèse PÉPIN, baptized at Charlesbourg on February 4th 1709, daughter of Jean PÉPIN and Margaret MOREAU.

Pierre GAUDET, born at Port-Royal, Acadia, in 1650, son of Denis GAUDET and Martine GAUTHIER, married around 1672 to Anne BLANCHARD, born in 1645, widow of François GUÉRIN, and daughter of Jean BLANCHARD and Radegonde LAMBERT.

Jacques BELOU, born in France in 1641, married around 1669 to Marie GIROUARD, born in Acadia in 1651, daughter of François GIROUARD and Jeanne AUCOIN of Port-Royal.

Abraham BOUDREAU, born at Port-Royal, Acadia, in 1663, son of Michel BOUDREAU and Michelle AUCOIN, married around 1684 to Cecile MELANSON, Born at Port-Royal in 1670, daughter of Charles MELANSON and Marie DUGAS.

Marin BOUCHER came to Canada with his brother Gaspard, who was the father of Pierre BOUCHER, the founder and Seigneur of Boucherville, Quebec, and the Governor of Three-Rivers, Quebec.

Pierre ST-DENIS, born in France in 1626, buried at Holy-Family, Ile d'Orleans, Quebec, on September 13th 1686, married in France to Vivienne BUNELLE, born in 1626. They came to Canada from Rouen, France.

Michel BOUCHARD, born in France in 1635, son of Clément BOUCHARD and Clémence BRASSARD, of Antille-le-Marois, diocese of La Rochelle, France, married at Chateau-Richer, Quebec, on December 2nd 1662, to Marie TROTINNE, born at La Rochelle, France in 1646. Michel BOUCHARD remarried at Quebec City on October 27th 1682, to Marie-Madeleine DELAPORTE, widow of Martin FOUGUET.

Guillaume PELLETIER, buried at Quebec City on November 28th 1657, was married to Michelle MORILLE.

Jerome GUERIN, born around 1610 at Martaizé, region of Loudun, department of Vienne, France, arrived in Acadia around 1636, had married in France around 1634 to Marie BLANCHARD, daughter of Guillaume BLANCHARD and Huguette POIRIER.

Jean BLANCHARD, born in France in 1611, son of Guillaume BLANCHARD and Huguette POIRIER, married around 1642 to Radegonde LAMBERT.

Urbain BEAUDRY called "Lamarche", born in 1621, son of Jean BEAUDRY and Jeanne BERTIN, of Luché, Anjou, France, buried in the church of Three-Rivers, Quebec, on August 23rd 1682, married in 1647 to Madeleine BOUCHER, born in 1621, buried in the church of Three-Rivers, on September 4th 1691, registered at Montreal on September 14th, daughter of Gaspard BOUCHER and Nicole LEMAINE.

Jean SOULARD, gunsmith, buried at Quebec City on July 7^{th} 1710, son of Jean SOULARD and Jeanne COUVREUR of St-Sauveur, diocese of LaRochelle, France, married first at Quebec City, on March 8^{th} 1666, to Catherine BOUTET, born in 1637, buried at Quebec City on June 1^{st} 1692, widow of Charles PHILIPPAUX, and daughter of Martin BOUTET and Catherine SOULANGE. Jean SOULARD remarried at Quebec City, on September 22^{nd} 1692, to Adriane DeROULLAND de St-George, buried at Quebec City on November 18^{th} 1696, daughter of Adrien DeROULLAND de St-George, the King's bodyguard, and Jeanne GUENON, of Mont-de-Bourg, diocese of Coutance, in Lower Normandie, France.

ROGET KUESSEY OF CAISSIE, born in Ireland in 1651, arrived at Port-Royal, Acadia, around 1665, and settled at Beausejour, Acadia, married around 1668 to Marie-Françoise POIRIER, born in 1649, daughter of Jean POIRIER and Jeanne CHABRAT. Charles MELANSON, born in 1643, probably in Scotland, came to Acadia from Scotland with his brother Pierre, around 1657, via Boston, married around 1663 to Marie DUGAS, born in 1648, daughter of Abraham DUGAS and Marguerite DOUCET.

Germain DOUCET returned to France after the capitulation of Port-Royal to the English in 1654.

Guillaume BLANCHARD, born around 1590 at Martaizé, region of Loudun, department of Vienne, France, arrived in Acadia with his wife, Huguette POIRIER.

Gaspard BOUCHER, born at Langy, diocese of Mortagne, France, came to Canada with his brother, Marin BOUCHER, was married in 1619 to Nicole LEMAINE. Gaspard was the father of Pierre BOUCHER, the founder and seigneur of Boucherville, Quebec, and the governor of Three-Rivers, Quebec.

Martin BOUTET, married to Catherine SOULANGE, was a teacher of mathematics from St-Martin, France.

Jean GUYO, Lord of Dubuission, Mason, came from Perché, France, and married Madeleine BOULE in 1634.

Guillaume COUILLARD, buried in the church Hotel-Dieu at Quebec City, on March 4^{th} 1663, married at Quebec City on August 26^{th} 1621, to Guillemette HEBERT, born in 1606, buried in the church Hotel-Dieu, at Quebec City on October 20^{th} 1684, daughter of Louis HEBERT and Marie ROLLET.

Jacques BOISSEL, meat dealer at Quebec City, born in France in 1601, married in 1639 to Marie ERIPERT or HERIPEL in 1611, buried at Quebec City on November 1st 1697. Gervais BISSON, born in France in 1601, buried at Quebec City on August 1st 1674, married in 1635 to Marie LEREAU, born in 1623, buried at Quebec City on September 14th 1687.

Jean POIRIER, born in France in 1626, married in France in 1648 to Jeanne CHABRAT, arrived in Acadia around 1649, died in 1652.

Jean GUYON, buried at Quebec City on May 3rd 1663, was married to Mathurine ROBIN, buried at Quebec City on April 17th 1662.

Zacharie CLOUTIER, born in France in 1590, buried at Chateau-Richer, Quebec, on September 17^{th} 1677, married to Xainte DUPONT, born in France in 1596, buried at Chateau-Richer on July 14^{th} 1680.

Pierre MIVILLE called "the Swiss", master carpenter, captain of the Lauzon shore, came from LaRochelle, France was buried at Quebec City on October 15th 1669, was married to Charlotte MAUGIS, born in 1581, buried at Quebec City on October 11th 1676.

Jean THERIAULT, born in 1601 at Martaizé, region of Loudun, department of Vienne, France, married in France around 1635 to Perrine BOURG, arrived in Acadia around 1637.

Jean GAUDET, born around 1575, at Martaize, department of Vienne, France, married in second wedding, around 1628, to Nicole COLESON, arrived in Acadia around 1636.

Guillaume TRAHAN, born in France in 1611, son of Nicholas TRAHAN and Renée DESLOGES, of the parish of Montreuil-Belley, Marne et Loire, France, married in France to Françoise CHARBONNEAU, came to Acadia in 1636 from St-Germain de Bourgueil, Indre-et-Loire, France. Guillaume TRAHAN remarried around 1666, to Madeleine BRUN, born in 1645, daughter of Vincent BRUN and Marie BREAU.

François GAUTREAU, born in 1613 at Martaizé, region of Loudun, department of Vienne, France, married to Edmée LEJEUNE, arrived in Acadia around 1636. Jean LeMARCHE called "Laroche", carpenter, son of Jean LeMARCHE called "Laroche" and Marie BLONDEAU, of St-Laurent, Paris, France, married at Montreal on October 13th 1654, to Catherine HUREAU, born in France in 1640, buried at Montreal on October 20th 1680, daughter of Jean HUREAU and Guillemette LaROUSSIERE, of La Freche, France.

Jean COTE, buried in the Quebec City church, on March 28th 1661, married at Quebec City on November 17th 1635, to Ann MARTIN, born in 1614, buried at Quebec City on December 4th 1684, daughter of Abraham MARTIN called "the Scot" and Marguerite LANGLOIS.

Guillaume COUTURE, born in France in 1617, buried in 1702, son of Guillaume COUTURE and Madeleine MALET, of St-Godard, Rouen, France married at Quebec City on November 16th 1649, to Ann AYMARD, born in France in 1629, buried at Levis, Quebec, on January 18th 1700, daughter of Jean AYMARD and Marie BUREAU, of St-André, Niort, France.

Mathieu CHORET, living at Beauport, Quebec, buried at Quebec City on March 28th 1664, married in 1642 to Sébastienne VEILLON, born in 1626.

Pierre LOIGNON, born in 1631, married at Quebec City on October 8th 1652, to Françoise ROUSSIN, born in France in 1636, buried at Quebec City on December 4th 1691, daughter of Jean ROUSSIN, of Tourouvre, Perché, France.

Robert CARON, buried at Quebec City, on July 8^{th} 1656, married at Quebec City on October 25^{th} 1637, to Marie CREVET, born in 1621.

Jean GAGNON, born in France in 1611, buried in the church of Chateau-Richer on April 2nd 1670, son of Pierre GAGNON and Renée ROGER, of Tourouvre, France, married at Quebec City on July 29th 1640, to Marguerite COCHON, born in France in 1620, daughter of Jean COCHON and Marguerite COINTEL, of Dieppe, France.
