While everyone at SUNTEP and the Institute at large had hoped to celebrate the joyous occasion at the E.A. **Rawlinson Centre for The** Arts in Prince Albert, this could not be possible because of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Geordy McCaffrey, GDI Executive Director, Bonnie Novotny, the Head of SUNTEP Prince Albert, and SUNTEP Prince Albert faculty and staff thanked and congratulated the 17 graduates.

The graduates included Shelby Constant, Susan Cox, Leah Drabot, Jennifer Durocher, Tia Ewashko, Amanda Hoey, Fayth Kaiswatum, Brett Little, Nicole Magnin, Ryan Munshaw, Jolene Peters, Kelsey Petit, Kelley Scriven, Ashley Smith, Brandi Soles, Tiffany Ross, and Cylie Williams.

"Graduation is a time of celebration and accomplishment for students," Said Bonnie Novotny. "It is a privilege to be part of SUNTEP Prince Albert students' journey as they go through selfdiscovery, academic and personal accomplishments, and the ultimate success of completing their degree." Bonnie, who is a SUNTEP Prince Albert graduate, asserted that "I know firsthand how empowering the program is. The students leave SUNTEP with friends, a sense of belonging, and a strong understanding of Métis and First Nations culture."

Geordy McCaffrey noted, "Everyone at the Institute is proud of the hard work, resilience and adaptability of the SUNTEP Prince Albert Class of 2020 in the face of the pandemic and what has become an unprecedented celebration of their achievement."

A common thread across the comments made by the graduates was positive words of gratitude and appreciation.

Shelby Constant said, "I want to thank staff at SUNTEP for their commitment and support over the past four years. I thank my family, without them, I would not be here today. I want to also thank me for not quitting and for doing the hard work."

Jennifer Durocher said, "SUNTEP has been my family for the past four years. I am grateful for my children for all the support and patience, and for my mom and sister who were always just a phone call away. Thank you to my co-op teacher who was very supportive."

Tia Ewashko was guite candid in her reflection: "This journey was not always easy. So, I want to thank those who helped me along the way. SUNTEP Faculty, and the Catholic School Division for welcoming me with open arms and all the support during my practicum. I thank my students who were always in their best behavior, especially, when we had guests come in. Thanks to my friends and family. I am proud of myself and my classmates."

Fayth Kaiswatum explained why she was grateful: "SUNTEP has changed my life for the better. I am grateful to become an Indigenous role model for all the kids out there that need somebody just like I did. It was tough being a mom and full time student. But the people around me were loving, caring, and understanding." She continued, "Because of SUNTEP's supportive environment, I was able to earn my degree. I am excited about the future."

**Métis Enhance Culture and Programming** By Valerie G. Barnes-Connell

Much has happened with Métis Nation—Saskatchewan (MN-S) and thus, with the Jim Brady Métis Local #19 Corporation Inc. in recent months with the signing of the agreement between the federal Liberal government and MN-S.

On June 27, 2019, MN-S and the Government of Canada signed the Métis Recognition and Self-Government Agreement according to the MN-S news release dated June 27, 2019.

The signing was termed 'historic' and 'a momentous step toward reconciliation:' and recognizing MN-S's right to 'self-government and selfdetermination,' where the way is open to start working on basic governance concerns, including such areas as citizenship, leadership selection and financial accountability.

This historic agreement is a major step toward guaranteeing our rights to our and, our resources, our education, and our culture. It is real progress for our people.' Glen McCallum, MN-S President, is quoted as saving in the news release.

The Agreement was the base for several initiatives here in La Ronge. The launch of the Northern Saskatchewan Indigenous Teacher Education Program (NSITEP) is history in the making, Earl Cook, MN-S Minister of Education, said at the launch September 5, 2019.

While there have been many new initiatives over the intervening months, MN-S's focus has been on supporting their members in the COVID-19 pandemic. MN-S announced \$2.88 in COVID-19 relief for Métis households for childcare supports, personal protective equipment (PPE) and cost of living hardships, according to the MN-S news release dated March 31, 2020.

MN-S announced programs to support Métis people through this pandemic - the **Emergency Housing Support** Program and the Personal Protective Equipment. Information is available through their regional representatives or by calling 1-833-343-8391. For Childcare Support, please contact Lisa Fleming at Ifleming@mns.work or call 1-833-343-8391.

Among initiatives MN-S had been working on before the pandemic – early learning and childcare and post-secondary education, setting up a regional office in La Ronge, the Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) education and employment office with a counsellor.

The Métis Registry is another initiative, through with MN-S assists people with their membership registration. People can get assistance with this through their regional offices.

As a direct result of the signing of the Agreement, three new offices, housed in the Kikinahk Friendship Centre in La Ronge, opened in the fall of 2019. They are: an MN-S regional office with Manager Anne Dorion; GDI Training and Employment, with Employment Counsellor, Victoria Murray; and the Jim Brady Métis Local Corporation Inc. with President Laura Burnouf. Earl Cook is the **Regional Representative and** MN-S treasurer.

It's been a rather unique year. First, learning was moved from face-to-face to remote learning amidst the Covid-19 pandemic. However, the amazing ABE instructors got down to task to ensure that all students had what they needed to continue on with their learning at home using various remote learning platforms such as Goggle Classroom, Facebook groups, and Zoom. Everyone quickly adapted to the new 'norm' for the remainder of the year.

It was an honour to work and learn alongside these goaloriented graduates whose future plans include pursuing further studies in certificate, diploma and degree programs. The graduation program opened with prayers followed by a speech by Cort Dogniez (Métis education consultant with Greater Saskatoon Catholic Schools). The program coordinator, Marilyn Black and instructors each shared achievements and stories from the year, which showcased the determination and grit of the students, and Métis heritage in general.

Tyson Bueckert gave the valedictorian address and his family helped to decorate his home background. This was a beautiful show of DTI's impact students, families and the larger community. Each graduate received an 'award' and a blanket with an embossed DTI logo, along with the usual certificate and sash. More importantly, we learned that we are all strong, resilient and can learn in different settings - which is incredibly empowering and a characteristic of Métis people! # GDI Communicator Métis Nation University Funding Application Opens

Geordy McCaffrey, GDI Executive Director, received a cheque from Dr. Earl Cook, Treasurer of the Métis Nation— Saskatchewan, for the Métis Nation University Sponsorship on May 27, 2020.

The Métis Nation University Sponsorship flows from the Canada-Métis Nation Post-Secondary Education Sub-Accord which was signed by the Métis National Council (MNC) President MNC President Clément Chartier and the Federal Minister of Indigenous Services Hon. Seamus O'Regan in 2019. It provides direct supports for Métis university level students. The Métis Nation– Saskatchewan (MN–S) is a governing member of the MNC and will receive over \$80 million over 10 years. As the post-secondary education arm of the MN–S, GDI is tasked with administration of the Métis Nation University funding.

Applications for Métis Nation University Sponsorship for 2020/21 are now open. Please apply online at www.gdins.org/university. Application deadline is extended to July 1, 2020.

This is the second year in which Métis university students can access the funding. In 2019/20, a total of 483 Métis students from Saskatchewan received \$3.92 million in financial assistance. The funding covers tuition, income support, travels, dependent care allowance, and special needs costs. The students were from all the 12 MN–S Regions.

GDI was instrumental in providing research and guidance to the Métis postsecondary file. We thank the Government of Canada, MNC, and the MN–S for this investment in education. For more information, please contact us via email at
