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NURTURING OUR FUTURE MÉTIS PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES PROJECT ANNOUCED WITH NEW FEDERAL FUNDING

On October 25th, 2023, Gabriel Dumont the long-term effects of residential Institute staff and board members gathered in the GDI Gallery to announce the Nurturing Our Future Métis Public Health Services project alongside our partners from Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC), the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA), and Métis Nation—Saskatchewan (MN —S).

This project received a \$14.6 milliondollar federal investment from the Skills and Partnership Fund, and this funding will help create new training opportunities for healthcare programs at Dumont Technical Institute for 600 Métis students over the next five years.

MN—S Senator Nora Cummings opened the event by sharing warm words about the power of education to overcome

schools and working toward reconciliation and a brighter future for everyone. She encouraged Métis people of any age to seek out their education and learn new skills to bring back to their communities.

"For over 25 years, GDI has been training students to be healthcare professionals in a wide variety of occupations." said Brett Vandale, Acting GDI Executive Director "Our graduates leave us with the professional skills to provide a high standard of care and the ability to enhance the quality of care for Indigenous communities by ensuring graduates are also connected to their culture."

FUTURE EDUCATORS PAY TRIBUTE TO NATIONAL DAY FOR TRUTH AND RECONCILATION

On the day prior to the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, a group of the province's future teachers gathered along Prince Albert's riverbank.

The event has become a proud tradition for the students at SUNTEP, who were also joined this year by students enrolled in the Gabriel Dumont Institute's Adult Basic Education program.

Beige Unger, a third year faculty advisor and instructor at the school noted they are an indigenous program and that it's very important for all the students to be involved in the community.

"They're going to be going out into the schools and teaching their students about truth and reconciliation so having these experiences is so important," she said

Rochelle Hing is a third year SUNTEP student and brought her young daughter along to Friday's gathering. She explained it felt good to be a part of the cause. Her thoughts were also with the parents who lost loved ones.





"Just to have my child here and be able to say goodnight to her as some of them did not get to," she said.

Erica Warkentine, another third year student, said just being able to stand there together was a really big privelege.

"There were so many years where gatherings like this would not be allowed and so to be able to be here today I think is a really big act of resiliency," she said, adding she's glad we can live in a time where we can talk about these things and raise awareness.

The gathering was held at the site of the MMIWG moment, <u>which was</u> <u>erected in June 2021</u>.

A moment of silence was also held on Friday for those children lost to the residential schools.

DUMONT TECHNICAL INSTITUTE'S PRINCE ALBERT STUDENTS' BATOCHE FIELD TRIP

On September 12th 2023, the Adult Basic Education and Practical Nursing Prince Albert students traveled to Batoche. Students took part in many activities and exhibits throughout the day, beginning in the Batoche Theatre where students were treated to a historical re-enactment video of the events leading up to and including the Battle of Batoche.

Students took the Batoche shuttle to the Saint-Antoine de Padoue Church, which was built using the Red River construction frame technique and many were surprised and impressed by how few nails were used when constructing the building and that it took two full years to construct!

Notably, bullet holes from the gatling gun used against the Métis in the Resistance remain in the front of the rectory next door. Students were intrigued by how well preserved the rectory is, and how many items of historical and cultural significance reside there.

Students were then shuttled to the cemetery to pay homage to the Metis and their families who fought for our rights in 1885 during the Resistance. Some students visited their family members and the tour guide led students through the historical graves such as Gabriel Dumont.

Students enjoyed a lunch of stew and bannock, before exploring the visitor center, which included Metis artwork and wares as well as historical costumes to dress up in. before being shuttled out to the Caron house. In the Caron house, students could see and speculate on how a Metis family in the late 1800's lived. Inside, students noted the root cellar where important food for winter was kept, the well worn floor in the living room where dances may have been held and the twig-lath in the wall which exemplified Metis ingenuity in architecture. Some students even got to take home some produce from the Caron House garden!

Students enjoyed the day out on the land, with their culture surrounding them. In spite of all the circumstances that our Metis ancestors had to overcome, our students have the opportunity to revisit ties to their land, language, lifestyle and culture each time we venture out to Batoche. As an educator, I am so grateful that our students have these opportunities and are able to create and maintain connections to their culture.

IGNYTE RECONCILIATION EVENT A GREAT SUCCESS

In spirit of Truth and Reconciliation week 2023, GDI Training and Employment partnered to deliver a special reconciliation event in Saskatoon on October 4th. The event was titled: Ignyte Reconciliation and was hosted by Saskatchewan Young Professionals and Entrepreneurs (SYPE), in partnership with GDI and SIIT. The event served as a stage for local young Indigenous entrepreneurs and professionals to share stories and shed light on the profound meaning of Truth and Reconciliation. Indigenous, and non-Indigenous entrepreneurs and professionals shared stories to inspire actionable steps towards meaningful reconciliation and progress.

GDI Director of Operations, Alecia Nagy welcomed participants to the event, representing both GDI and the volunteer SYPE board. GDI Training and Employment staff members Spenser Thibault and Randi Ross each presented

their own stories of what meaningful reconciliation means to them through storytelling and imagery. Randi boldly shared her story of being raised in a Métis family and explained how discrimination affected her from an early age. Spenser Thibault passionately spoke of the importance of integrating Métis language in daily life, and his unofficial project of instilling and revitalizing the Michif language in the GDI workspace and beyond. Both GDI presenters were passionate about Métis culture and heritage and received resoundingly positive recognition for their stories. GDI board member and Elder, May Henderson was in attendance and graciously represented GDI at the event. Participants left the event with a deeper understanding of reconciliation, and shared personal steps and actions that support and foster reconciliation.

1885 RESISTANCE HISTORIC ARTIFACT REPATRIATED TO GDI MÉTIS MUSEUM

The Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) has just acquired a long-lost artifact from the 1885 Resistance, a Hollis & Son's Hudson's Bay Company Indian Trade Fusil, c. late 1870s.

Last June, Matthew Weickert,
Collections Coordinator for the
Fanshawe Pioneer Village in Ontario,
contacted the Institute about the
possibility of repatriating this fusil,
which was taken from the Métis or a
First Nations ally during the 1885
Resistance by an Ontario-based soldier.
After some discussion between GDI and
Fanshawe, it was agreed that the fusil
should be donated to GDI to hold in trust
on behalf of the Métis.

For several years, the fusil was on display in the Royal Canadian Regiment in London, Ontario. It was taken from Batoche by Sergeant W.D. Hill of the Seventh Fusilier, North West Field Force who was initially stationed at Clarks Crossing, north of present-day artifact back to the Métis community. A heartfelt maarsii should be directed to Matthew and Dawn and to the Fanshawe Pioneer Village and to the Royal Canadian Regiment Museum for allowing this artifact to come home to Saskatchewan and to the Métis.

Saskatoon during the resistance. We do not know for sure whether this fusil was owned and used by a Métis or a First Nations ally during the Battle of Batoche. However, chances are very likely that it was used by the Métis since these types of trade fusils were the main weapon used by the Métis during the 1885 Resistance.

As an example of reconciliation, both the Fanshawe Pioneer Village and the Royal Canadian Regiment agreed to repatriate the fusil back to the Métis through GDI. Fanshawe Pioneer Village employees, Matthew Weickert and Dawn Miskelly worked with Institute staff to repatriate this precious artifact back to the Métis community. A heartfelt maarsii should be directed to Matthew and Dawn and to the Fanshawe Pioneer Village and to the Royal Canadian Regiment Museum for allowing this artifact to come home to Saskatchewan and to the Métis.


