PRINCE ALBERT PRACTICAL NURSING PROGRAM TOOK PART IN A CULTURAL WORKSHOP

On December 4, 2025, Dumont Technical Institute's (DTI) Year 1 and Year 2 Practical Nursing students in Prince Albert participated in a meaningful cultural workshop hosted by Gabriel Dumont Institute's (GDI) Culture and Heritage Department. The workshop was led by GDI Culture and Heritage staff—Karon Shmon, Tracey Verishine, and Bonnie Hrycuik—who guided students through stories, teachings, and hands-on cultural activities.

The session began with Karon reading *Métis Christmas Mittens* by

Leah Dorion. Each student received their own copy of the book to take home, supporting their connection to Métis storytelling and seasonal traditions. Students then rolled up their sleeves for a hands-on crafting experience. Using scraps of Hudson's Bay blankets, real fur, and traditional techniques, they embroidered and stitched their own mitten. The unique embroidery choices made each mitten deeply personal and meaningful, and provided each student a one-of-a-kind keepsake.

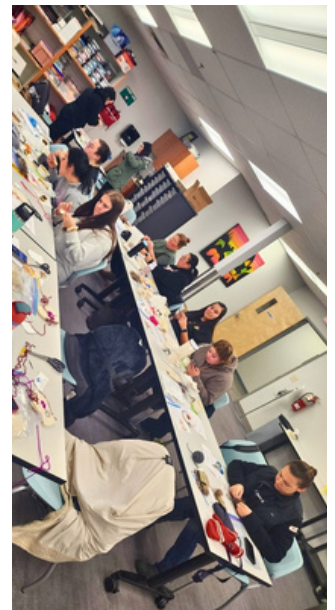

It was great getting to come together with all our future nurses, relax, and take our minds off our workload. It was such a good learning experience for us all, and I'm very glad we got to experience it!"

After months of intense study in their nursing programs, students truly appreciated the chance to slow down and participate in an activity that was both creative and culturally connected. PN Year 1 student Mollie shared, "This really was a great experience. As a person who uses art as stress management, I'm always looking for new mediums to

try. And the fact that I can put my cultural background into it with understanding now is actually really nice. I'm still learning about my heritage, and this was a huge step forward for me."

The workshop offered a welcome break, fostering reflection, community, and cultural appreciation. To add to the day, students and staff shared a warm, locally prepared meal. When Métis pilot Jordan Samoila decided to take the next step in his aviation career, he wasn't just thinking about flight hours or new destinations—he was thinking about his family and the communities he could serve.

After more than 10 years in the cockpit, Jordan knew it was time for a new challenge. He wanted greater stability for his loved ones and the opportunity to use his skills to make a real difference. That goal led him to Chinook Helicopters Ltd., where he completed specialized training in August 2025 to upgrade his commercial pilot licence and become eligible for air medical flying.

"Loving what you do every day is the greatest feeling," Jordan says. For him, that means combining his passion for flying with his desire to help others as an air medical pilot. He now plays a vital role in transporting patients who need urgent care from remote northern communities to hospitals across the province.

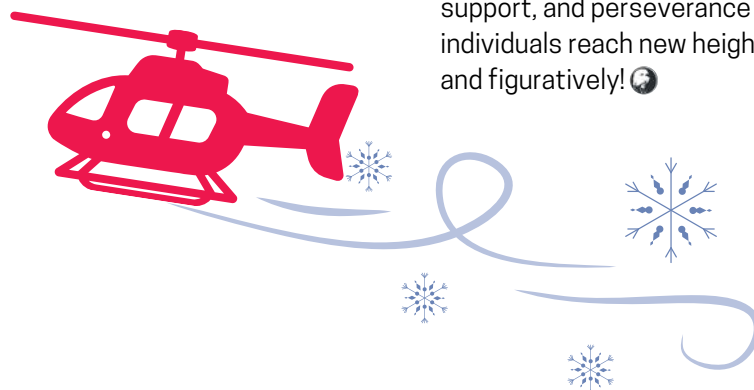
Air medical pilots are often the lifeline between isolated areas and emergency medical services. The job requires precision, calm under pressure, and a deep sense of responsibility. For Jordan, it's exactly where he wants to be. The work is meaningful, and he enjoys working closely with medical professionals to help people in their time of need.



Jordan's journey wasn't easy. The advanced training required time, focus, and financial resources—but he didn't have to do it alone.
